

# Seizure of AP phone records insult to independent press

Distrust of government secrecy has been elevated to an exceptional level with the disclosure the Justice Department covertly examined two months of Associated Press phone records to determine who leaked details to the AP about a foiled terrorist plot.

You may be tempted to dismiss as gratuitous wailing the news media's concern over this serious breach of the constitutional wall between government and the press. But the chilling consequences of the Justice Department's overzealous intrusiveness could well impact your ability to know what your government is doing or not doing on your behalf.

This amounts to spying on an American news organization common practice in dictatorships but scary conduct in a democratic system that prizes the public value of an independent watchdog press. What makes this case so egregious is the Justice Department went about securing an array of phone records from at least 20 AP phone lines, including the personal cellphones of reporters and editors, without allowing the news agency

an opportunity to object. Furthermore, it violates the department's 30-year-old subpoena guidelines requiring it to make "every reasonable effort to obtain through alternative means" information that might be included in the media's phone records.

The Justice Department's explanation that it complied with national security laws and limited its review of last year's April and May records to the phone numbers of the callers and not the content of the calls is thin cover for this affront to the free press clause of the First Amendment.

The motive for wanting to know who talked to the AP is clear but it is also irresponsible. Justice Department sleuths were hell-bent on hunting down the confidential sources for the May 7, 2012, AP story about a CIA operation to stop an airliner

bomb plot in Yemen.

Why this obsession with nailing the leakers? The story was an embarrassment to the president, who had assured the American people there was no credible terrorist threat last May, around the time of the anniversary of the killing of Osama bin Laden.

The AP held the story for several days when told by the White House it would interfere with intelligence gathering. But after assurances any national security risk had passed, the news agency published the story. The Justice Department hound dogs were close behind.

You may be tempted to dismiss as gratuitous wailing the news media's concern over this serious breach of the constitutional wall between government and the press. But the chilling consequences of the Justice Department's overzealous intrusiveness could well impact your ability to know what your government is doing or not doing on your behalf.







The 5K Race and Kids Fun Run in memory of Kristin "Krit" Kearins has partnered with MassBike this vear around a campaign to help keep bicyclists safe.

MassBike is an advocacy group that aims to protect the rights of bicyclists and promote their dreams of making Massachusetts a safer, more enjoyable place to ride.

The association between Krit Classic and MassBike was a natural one. Sheehv said, given her daughter died from severe head trauma after a bike accident Sheehy said. in September 2008.

The 2000 graduate of Andover High School and popular athlete was just 26 when her bike slipped while memory to be distributed to she was pedaling on a rainslicked bridge in Boston and wherever the organization she hit her head.

# A storybook title to remember Doucette recalls UMass Lowell's national championship

It's been 25 years since the 1987-88 UMass Lowell men's basketball team won the Div. 2 national title.

And Doucette, who was a lot louder back then, was the head coach.

Considering that no other Div. 2 school in Massachusetts has won a men's basketball title before or since makes the anniversary a little more special.

"This team is so close that they get everyone together every five years since 1988, but the night of the 25th was very special," Doucette said. "Being around these guys, I can't believe the feeling I get. It's a very special group of guys who gave me the sense that they wanted to lace them up and go out that night and play. A very confident and cocky group, but they have earned that right."

While UMass Lowell was always known as a hockey school with its blue-collar theme, a perfect

representation of the city of Lowell, Doucette's basketball minions fit the bill, too.

"Our team personified the blue-collar, hard-working city of Lowell as much as any ULowell hockey team ever has," Doucette said. "We had more stitches and broken noses from hard work than I have ever seen in one season. They truly represented the community of Lowell to a T. These guys simply went out and competed no matter what the cost.'

The improbable run started with UMass Lowell being ranked 20th in the country when the NCAA tourney started. Doucette's team beat No. 5-ranked University of New Haven, which had beat them twice during the regular season, before besting No. 3 Alabama A&M.

'That was before 10,000 fans in Alabama," Doucette recalled. "It was amazing."

At the Final Four in Springfield, Lowell beat topranked Florida Southern, which had beaten four Div. 1 schools that year, and then Alaska Anchorage in the national title game.

Doucette later continued his successful coaching career at Div. 1 UNC-Asheville, S.W. Missouri State and Chaminade University in Hawaii before becoming an athletic director at Hamilton-Wenham.

He laughs when he recalls

"People don't understand that that was a storybook season," said Doucette. "To do it took a heck of a lot of overachievement.'




