Department issues 'challenge' coin to veterans

For generations, challenge coins have played a vital role in the lives of members of the military and veterans at home and abroad as tokens of unit pride and camaraderie.

Challenge coins typically bear the name and logo of a military unit. They have never borne the Andover town seal

— until now. Issued in time for Veterans Day 2013 on Monday, the special coins are being circulated by the town's Veteran Services Department to distinguished Andover veterans who have played a vital role in advancing veteran-related causes at home, according to Mike Burke, department director.

To those who receive them, challenge coins aren't just

metal tokens with the town seal stamped on them.

"A challenge coin is very special," Burke said. "These are collected. Members of the military will have a handful of coins for all the units they've served in in the past or made a contribution to."

The "challenge" aspect of the name comes from the coins' more casual use in coffee shops and bars around the globe,

according to Burke.

"When you're challenged with a coin ... Someone can pull out their coin and show it to you," Burke said. "If you've been given a coin from that unit in the past, and you don't have it on hand, you've been challenged. Now you're on the hook to buy a cup of coffee or beverage of choice."

Medical firm eyes cutbacks

Eisai to lay off 72 from Andover facilities

Eisai Inc., an Andover pharmaceutical manufacturer that employs 240 people in town, is laying off 72 employees from its two, local facilities and closing down one of its research divisions.

The company, which makes health care products including cancer and Alzheimer's treatments, has two facilities, including a six-year-old, \$65 million, state-of-the-art research lab on Corporate Drive.

The layoff of roughly 30 percent of Eisai's local workforce was announced in a letter late last month to the Board of Selectmen from the company's human resources department in Woodcliff Lake, N.J.

"This is part of a reorganization plan that will include the closing of its pilot plant, the reduction of a significant portion of the Pharmaceutical Science and Technology Core Function Unit in Andover, and workforce reductions in other Andover departments," the letter said. "These actions are expected to be permanent."

By law, companies intending to make

Water sludge battle flows on

Judge urges Berberian, town to settle

Locked in a costly, drawn-out legal battle with the town, Bancroft Road resident James Berberian took his case directly to his adversaries Monday night, asking members of the Board of Selectmen for face-to-face meetings without lawyers as a way to settle his lawsuit.

Berberian, of 2-4 Bancroft Road, held up a packet of documents, quoting from them extensively throughout his

15-minute presentation. "I've invited selectmen to meet me without counsel to review these," he said, waving the documents in the air. "If you had seen these, you wouldn't have let this continue one more day."

Berberian sued the town in federal court in February 2012 alleging that public works employees dumped water tainted with arsenic and other toxic metals into wetlands on

Former Phillips doctor pleads guilty in child porn case

Dr. Richard Keller, an Andover resident and former longtime medical director at Phillips Academy in Andover, had pleaded guilty in federal court to child pornography charges.

Keller, 57, of 10 Cyr Circle, faces five to six years in jail on two counts of receiving and one count of possessing child pornography following his guilty plea on Monday to charges dating to September 2012.

He remains in the custody of U.S. marshals and is scheduled for sentencing Feb. 27 in Boston.

According to a plea agreement presented before U.S. District Court Judge Dennis Saylor IV, Keller admitted buying child pornography from a Toronto company and having some of it sent to the student health center

EISAI: Company to lay off 72 local employees

Large-scale layoffs are required to inform local authorities in advance.

The layoffs are expected to take effect Dec. 31, 2013.

A spokeswoman for Eisai, Suzanne Grogan, said Monday that it's not just Andover that's being affected. She said 7 percent of Eisai's global research and development organization is also affected.

"We are always looking at ways of strengthening our capabilities," she said. "This is part of our periodic evaluation of our resources. We have to make sure we have our resources allocated to our key projects."

She said Andover would continue to be a hub for discovery research.

The company employs about 10,500 people worldwide. In the U.S., there are about 1,500 Eisai employees and another 300 working for Eisai subsidiaries.

She said layoffs are also being made at the company's New Jersey headquarters and at one of the subsidiaries in Pennsylvania.

The last layoff by the company was in spring 2011, when 20 percent of the company was cut across the board, she said.

The layoffs were not in response to anything in particular in the economy, but are "based on our business needs."

Haruo Naito, the president of the company, made reference to the difficult economy in a message on the Eisai website.

"Uncertainty regarding the global economy mounted during fiscal 2012, including the financial problems in Europe and the U.S. and slowdowns in the economies of China and other emerging countries," he said.

"As the global economy sways, the world's pharmaceuticals market is shifting into an era of great globalization."

He added that "growth has become sluggish in developed countries, while opportunities for growth are expanding in emerging and developing countries."

According to a list supplied by the human resources officer at Eisai, positions that are being cut locally include scientists, managers and clerical workers, among others.

Eisai opened its first Andover facility, next door to the new building, in 1989. That marked the Japanese company's first permanent home in the U.S.

"It's really a morale booster, fun and camaraderie, but at the same point, it has historical significance to belonging to something elite," Burke added.

The town seal on the obverse of the coin depicts Cutshamachie, the Algonquin sagamore who tradition has it sold the land later incorporated as Andover for six English pounds and a coat.

The other side of the coin bears the insignia of the various military branches and the inscription "Andover Veteran — Proudly Served."

The coins were paid for through the Veteran Services' gift account, a funding source based on donations to the department.

Frank Raymond, a Veteran Services employee, has a challenge coin of his own — but not from direct military service.

"I have what was called a quality coin. They called it, 'The Big Q,'" Raymond said. "Industry uses these, as well as military and things of that nature. It has a slightly different aspect to it."

Raymond worked for a company that was contracted to do work for the defense industry.

"They gave us a little certificate and a coin as a memento that we achieved," he said. "It wasn't a great, big deal, wasn't something that was touted at the time in the press, but it was an honor for us."

BERBERIAN: Town, resident urged to settle lawsuit

his property in November 2010.

The town and Berberian attempted to settle the case in nonbinding mediation earlier this year and even came close to an agreement, only to see it fail at the last minute.

The case is back in federal court. During a hearing last week, Magistrate Judge Robert B. Collings urged attorneys for both sides to attempt to reach a settlement, according to documents in the case.

Monday night, in response to Berberian, selectmen Chairman Alex Vispoli read a three-page statement, with attachments, saying board

members were limited in what they could say about the case because it was pending litigation.

But, he said, the town has attempted to settle "because of extensive legal fees and consultant fees being incurred by all of the parties in the litigation."

Vispoli also said the town had offered to make Berberian a settlement payment of \$440,000, without admitting wrongdoing, but that the deal failed when Berberian couldn't reach a financial settlement with an engineer working for the town on the site.

Finally, the town said it would be filing a report with the Department of

Environmental Protection this week, which would include a human health risk assessment of the site.

Berberian repeated several times that he is concerned about the health and welfare of his family, including two children and nieces and nephews who lived with them.

He said the sediment posed a "significant risk for cancer" and that the sediment was in the Bancroft water tanks.

He quoted from another report saying that when Scuba divers went to take samples of the sludge at the bottom of the 6-million-gallon, underground reservoir near the Bancroft School, they reported that low visibility in the tank suggested that the sediment was actually suspended in the water, meaning it could get into the water supply.

But Vispoli, reading from

the town statement, said the water had been tested on numerous occasions and that there was no threat to public health.

Despite the public back and forth, settlement talks are continuing. The Board of Selectmen held an executive session Monday night to discuss the litigation.

Berberian said last week he made a settlement offer to the town that would remove a gag order local officials sought that would have prevented him or anyone associated with his side of the case from saying anything about the matter, even after it was settled.

"They wanted not just me to be gagged, but everyone else on my side of the table to be gagged as well," he said. "But we can't control everybody. We can't control what everybody says."

Restoring the grasslands

Trustees cut 15 acres of trees to replenish meadow landscape

In 1957, when John Kimball moved into his grandmother's house, located in the middle of what is now the Ward Reservation off Prospect Road, he could look east over open fields and an apple orchard.

Nearly 60 years later, that vista had become crowded out by a heavy growth of trees, all but destroying the orchard and the meadow ecosystem that had grown up around it.

Last year, the Trustees of Reservations, which owns much of the Ward Reservation that straddles Andover and North Andover, hired a tree company to come in and cut 15 acres of those trees as part of a habitat restoration program.

Today, the field looks much as it did almost 50 years ago, except that only a few apple trees survived and there are still some stumps left following the forestry operation that took place over the course of a year, starting August 2012 and ending this past summer.

Russ Hopping, ecologist

for the Trustees, said that by clearing the forest, the property returns to its post-colonial condition, when much of Massachusetts was made up of fields crisscrossed with stone walls.

"Massachusetts was 80 percent deforested," he said. "And grassland habitat supports species like the bobolinks."

Kimball, who still lives on the property, said that clearing the site should bring

back more of the bobolinks, a small, lark-like blackbird that has become scarce in recent years.

"We hope to get more of them," he said. "I want people in years to come to see what the agrarian landscape was like 100 to 150 years ago."

Hopping said much of Massachusetts is now covered with second-growth forest, or trees that have grown up after being logged at least once before. Cutting back

that second-growth forest, he said, opens up habitat that was once common in Massachusetts, but is now harder and harder to find.

"We are looking to retain viable patches of landscape," he said. "This will be a meadow that will be mowed once a year."

The project was funded through a \$9,000 state grant from the Division of Fisheries and Wildlife. It was used to pay a North Shore tree-cutting company, Mayer Tree Service, which then came in, cleared the land, and sold most of the timber for firewood.

The 15-acre field slopes downhill from another, 12-acre meadow on top of a hill behind Kimball's house. He said management of existing meadows has brought in a huge number of bluebirds, which share territory peacefully with tree sparrows.

The land is also frequented by deer, which can be hunted by certified bow-hunters during certain times of year.

Part of the project was also aimed at controlling invasive species of plants and trees that are choking out native species.

Andover doctor leading allergy primer

Dr. John Saryan, an Andover allergist, will be the speaker at the Merrimack Valley Asthma & Allergy Educational Support Group's meeting on Wednesday, Nov. 20, at 7 p.m. at St. Michael Elementary School, opposite St. Michael Parish Church, 196 Main St., North Andover.

In his presentation, titled "Anaphylaxis: Understanding and Preventing Severe Allergic Reactions," Saryan will explain how to recognize, prevent and take care of someone who may be experiencing anaphylaxis. He will also identify how to decide when to use epinephrine, the life-saving

medication that comes in automatic easy-to-use injector devices. All of the devices now on the market will be presented and Saryan will demonstrate how to use them; discount coupons for them will be available.

Saryan is chairman of the Department of Allergy and Immunology at Lahey Clinic in Burlington and one of the medical advisors to the support group.

At a time when food allergies are increasingly common, especially among children, Kim Sousa of Andover, one of the support group leaders, says the presentation aims to emphasize

the need for everyone to know how to recognize the symptoms of a life-threatening reaction and be prepared to give immediate treatment.

"We especially encourage parents, teachers, child-care providers and the friends and relatives of people with allergies to attend," Sousa says. "What they learn may help save a life some day."

The program is open free to the public; registration is not required. Everyone who attends will receive a free, comprehensive book about food allergies.

The Asthma & Allergy Foundation of America, New England organizes

An eye-popping class guest

AHS students visited by \$87,000 electric car

While “show and tell” are three words not frequently heard in the halls of Andover High School, students in one science course were treated to a special guest last Friday: an \$87,000 electric car.

The school’s Environmental Sustainability Internship Class hosted an environmentally enamored, scientifically savvy couple from North Reading for a discussion delving into carbon consciousness.

The course taught by Melanie Cutler typically hosts a guest speaker every Friday. Last week, the speakers were North Reading residents John Rogers and his wife, Gigi Garcia-Rogers.

With them, the North Reading couple brought a lecture on reducing carbon dependency in an age where global warming and climate change concerns make headlines around the globe.

Their hour-long talk discussed ways students can reduce their carbon footprint at home and examples for how the Rogers’ household did it — in large part, by ditching the station wagon and buying a 2013 Tesla Model S electric car.

The vehicle, inside its sports car-like shell, is an electric car through and through. It charges through a power outlet, uses brakes that help recharge the battery mid-motion and can generally travel 240 to 260 miles per charge, Garcia-Rogers said.

While versions of the Model S go for around \$40,000 to \$60,000 to start,

the Rogers invested in a number of upgrades in the vehicle to make it ready for the New England winter weather, bringing the final bill to \$87,000, according to Garcia-Rogers.

After discussing their purchase and how they made the commitment, the couple surprised the students with a trip to see the car, which was hidden by the corner of the school’s field house.

The car left students buzzing as they examined the vehicle from front to rear, even getting inside to check out and go through its systems and built-in instrumentation and features.

While none of the students

said a Tesla purchase was planned anytime soon, some said seeing one in person left a lasting impression.

That included Maddie Moulden, whose family recently cut back on red meat to reduce their carbon footprint based on how cattle farming contributes to greenhouse gas emissions.

“It just reinforced what I already knew and showed me I made a good decision,” she said. “I definitely think, obviously not to this extent, but how you can buy a new car can save up to 18 percent on your efficiency... it was a lot more than I ever expected.”

Fellow student Tim Awiszus said he would likely look for ways to make his next set of wheels run off the grid.

“Right now, I’m not looking for a car, but as I get older, I’ll definitely think about this stuff,” he said.

Bringing in people from the community to provide their own form of testimony on an issue helps get ideas going for the students, said Steve Fink, an Andover resident closely tied to the program.

“The original idea was,

“Let’s get people who do stuff,” Fink said. “They would be models for the students on what their career could be.”

In many cases, students who may be considering a certain career path could finalize their decision after meeting someone who has been successful in the field, Cutler said.

John Rogers said the environmental internship

program is a great program because it allows the real world to reach through the school’s walls and touch students who will soon enter it.

“Climate change is pretty serious stuff, and there are pretty serious solutions,” Rogers said. “It’s great to have an avenue to reach kids who are really thinking about this stuff and connect them with the issues of the day.”

Memorial bracelets honor Andover dad

The South School community has launched a “Live Like Dave” campaign in hopes of ensuring the legacy of a local father killed in a car accident in September lives on.

The initiative in honor of David Vaughan not only seeks to support a trust fund established for his family, but to also pay tribute to the type of person the 40-year-old married father of three was and that everyone should try to be, Kim Hunter, a neighbor and longtime friend of the Vaughan family, said in an email.

South School’s PTO introduced the campaign at its recent Fall Fest with the sale of “Live Like Dave” bracelets. The initial drive raised \$1,600 to

support the Vaughan Family Trust Fund.

“But more importantly, we spread Dave’s message and put smiles on the faces of his sons, who attended the event,” Hunter wrote. “We are hoping this was just step one of many more ‘Live Like Dave’ events.”

Vaughan, of Lavender Hill Lane, was killed in an early-morning accident in late-September on Interstate 93 just past the River Road exit in Andover. He was headed to work at Canobie Seafoods, Inc. in Salem, N.H., which Vaughan’s extended family owns and operates.

Vaughan and his wife, Kristen, have two sons, Colin and Kevin, both enrolled at South School. Their daughter, Caroline, is a preschooler. Hunter said the bracelet campaign

makes good on a request Vaughan’s brother, Dan, made at his funeral. “Dave was nice to everyone; it didn’t matter if you were the president or the landscaper, he treated everyone with kindness and respect ...,” Hunter wrote. “When Dave’s brother, Dan, gave his eulogy, he asked us all to try and do ourselves a favor and ‘Live Like Dave.’ We are spreading Dave’s message.”

In an email to parents, South

South School’s “Live Like Dave” bracelets encourage students to live their lives with caring and compassion for others.

School Principal Dr. Colleen McBride thanked them for their “enduring support and tremendous generosity” toward the effort.

“By all accounts, David Vaughan treated everyone he came across in life with sincere kindness and great compassion,” McBride wrote. “Wearing a bracelet shows our support for the Vaughan family and sends a positive message to our children about the importance of caring for others, just like David did.”

KELLER: Doctor pleads guilty to child porn charges

at Phillips.

Keller, who was also a long-time pediatrician at Boston Children's Hospital, worked as Phillips Academy's medical director for 19 years until the academy failed to renew his contract in 2011.

John Palfrey, the head of school at Phillips, said in an email to students and parents after Keller's arrest last year that the decision to not renew Keller's contract was based on professional misconduct unrelated to the federal case.

Palfrey said Keller had been reprimanded in 1999 for using a school computer to access adult pornography and had shown an inappropriate cartoon to students in 2002.

On Monday, a spokeswoman at Phillips issued a statement reiterating that Keller left his position in April 2011 "for reasons unrelated to this case."

She added that "at no time during his employment or during the subsequent investigation has anyone alleged criminal behavior by Richard Keller relating to his former role with Phillips Academy."

As part of the plea agreement, Keller acknowledged

that he has had a sexual interest in adolescents since the early 1970s. In a written agreement filed in court, Keller also acknowledged viewing child pornography on the Internet and "that he has previously tried to stop, but failed to do so."

According to a press release from the U.S. Attorney's office, information about Keller first surfaced after foreign law enforcement officials seized the customer database of a Toronto company that sold child pornography. The database revealed Keller as a customer. Specifically, between July 2009 and January 2011, Keller purchased and ordered videos and images from this company on 19 different occasions. Those orders included more than 50 separate titles totaling more than \$2,695 in purchases.

In addition, more than 500 high-gloss print-outs of child pornography and approximately 60 to 100 DVDs of child pornography were seized from Keller's bedroom. Those materials depicted naked boys between the approximate ages of 10 and 14 engaged in lewd and lascivious displays of their genitalia.

Keller also possessed a

DVD containing child pornography, including images and videos depicting naked boys from approximately ages 7 to 16 engaged in sexual activity, including oral and anal sex, as well as sado-masochistic conduct.

Keller did not speak during the court hearing Monday except to answer questions from the judge.

He kept his hands folded under his chin as Assistant U.S. Attorney Stacy Dawson Belf described the charges against him.

Keller's lawyer, Max Stern, declined to comment after the hearing. Prosecutors also declined to comment.

In addition to his work as a pediatric endocrinologist at Children's Hospital in Boston, Keller also taught at Harvard Medical School. Keller has surrendered his Massachusetts medical license.

New Hampshire suspended his license to practice medicine in that state.

Keller had only been living in the 10 Cyr Circle house since September 2011, according to an affidavit filed in the case.

He previously resided at 48 Phillips St., which is on the campus of Phillips Academy.

Under the terms of the

agreement, Keller's attorney and federal prosecutors recommended a sentence of between five years, three months and 6 1/2 years.

The press release issued Monday said that Keller faces a mandatory minimum sentence of five years and up to 20 years in prison, up to lifetime supervised release and a \$250,000 fine on the charge of receipt of child pornography; and up to 10 years in prison, lifetime supervised release and a \$250,000 fine on the charge of possession of child pornography.

The case is brought as part of Project Safe Childhood, a nationwide initiative created in 2006 by the Department of Justice designed to protect children from exploitation and abuse.

Led by the U.S. Attorneys' offices and the Criminal Division's CEOS, Project Safe Childhood marshals federal, state and local resources to better locate, apprehend and prosecute individuals who exploit children, as well as identify and rescue victims.

'Andover Tomorrow' to map out town's future

The future of Andover will be discussed at a forum dubbed "Andover Tomorrow," beg hosted this month by the town's Economic Development Council.

Tim Vaill, chairman of the EDC, said the educational forum is intended to open up a "lively dialogue about the value of economic growth in Andover."

"This is an important dialogue as we begin to explore the future of Andover given the inevitable demographic changes and the economy we now face," he said. "We are particularly trying to bring public school families and seniors into the equation."

A flier that is being distributed around town calls it "an important discussion for the residents of Andover" and especially urges senior citizens and parents with school-age children to attend the meeting, which is slated for Wednesday, Nov.

The forum will feature Barry Bluestone, head of the Dukakis Urban Planning Center at Northeastern University in Boston — who the EDC calls one of the best-informed and most-entertaining speakers on the subject of town growth.

A panel of experts will include Greg Seabasky, chairman of Philips North America; Claudia Bach, former superintendent of Andover schools; and Charlie Kendrick, the former chairman of the Edgewood Retirement Community.

Vaill said the forum is in line with the EDC's mission, which is to "continually work on developing the right 'climate' in Andover such that attractive businesses will relocate here and that equally attractive families will move here. Our goal is to make Andover the best place to work and live in America."

CLASS: Students visit Statehouse in support of media literacy course

literacy course, which they completed last year, was invaluable in the process of teaching teenagers how to make informed decisions in an at-times distracting and volatile media climate.

"What I found most important was just being able to deconstruct messages in the media, whether it's a political message or someone trying to sell a child something," senior Cole Organisciak said. "That's especially important because there's a specific market that targets kids and teens these days."

Andover High introduced the course in the fall of 2001, according to Mary Robb, the teacher behind the syllabus. The school year and course was only a couple weeks old when disaster struck in New

York. The Sept. 11 attacks rattled the heart of America and turned the course on its head.

"A week into school, (the course) was tragically justified," Robb said.

With any national conversation joined by prime-time TV, media literacy can help people break down and understand the impact of what is being said by those who speak the loudest.

The course "helps you realize how you've been influenced, the manner in which you've been influenced, and it helps you navigate through that influence," Robb said. "We're products of the choices we make, and those choices are so fundamentally influenced by the media — so much so that we often don't see the impact of it."

Another senior, Sophie Draper, took the course last

fall as America braced for and moved through the 2012 general election season.

"We got to deconstruct media messages around the election and around each person's campaign," she said. "We talked about how gender roles are portrayed in the media, which was really interesting and eye-opening for people our age who get messages hurled at you."

While the course itself focused on day-to-day civic and political life and often navigated breaking news events on a whim, bringing its content to the Statehouse served as "practical knowledge" of the power of an informed voter, according to Robb.

"They, and their peers, will see that if you have something that's important, if you want to communicate with

your representative, your senator, you can," she said. "They're taking their knowledge and putting it to action."

That's the message the students communicated to the legislative delegation, Draper said.

"Instead of writing a letter, which is great, too, this is really face-to-face with the people in power," she said. "We're going to be the change."

In her testimony, Robb said she sought to emphasize Congress' "dismal approval ratings," which she said are to be blamed in part on the voter's inability to understand what's taking place in the world.

But that isn't Congress' fault, she said.

"We're to blame. We the

people, we've thrown up our hands," Robb said.

"Part of the reason we've done that is because we can't sift through all the media noise. When you put the class together — civics and media literacy — they learn how to filter through that noise and make decisions."

Robb said unfortunately, some people don't want to hear that message.

"There are people that don't want media literacy education primarily because it does make very savvy voters," she said. "If you're someone in Congress who doesn't want your constituents to know what you're doing, you don't want a class like this."

While the political world is

composed largely of people who identify themselves by the letters D and R, Draper said an understanding of how media operates could give people "a sense of self" by distancing themselves from one side or the other.

"I learned what I believe and how to discuss what I believe without picking one side," Draper said. "A lot of kids, and adults, too, they're too quick to be, like, 'I'm Democrat,' or 'I'm Republican.' They completely isolate themselves on that side of the spectrum without really discussing the issues."

"As a country, we're not red or blue. If you really break it down, people are a lot of shades of purple."

ANDOVER — In the late evening on Oct. 25th, 2013, Ásgeir Ásgeirsson passed away at Academy Manor after a courageous battle with Alzheimer's. He was 80 years old.

He was known for always wearing an Icelandic sweater and enjoying Icelandic smoked salmon for lunch. He met his wife, Nina Thornton, at a Scandanavian mixer. Nina had recently returned from a year in Finland as part of the AFS program. Ásgeir was named after his Icelandic uncle, Ásgeir Ásgeirsson, who was the second President and former prime minister of Iceland from



1952-1968. He was also very proud of his first cousin, Gunnar Hjaltison, who was a famous Icelandic artist. Ásgeir collected many of Gunner's paintings throughout his life as a hobby. Ásgeir was always very connected to his heritage and enjoyed taking his three children to Iceland to learn about the culture and family.

Survivors include his loving wife of 48 years, Nina Ásgeirsson of Andover and Falmouth, who he never forgot or stopped loving. Judge mulls request to unseal details in teacher's slaying

As prosecutors this week sought to dispel some of the more sensational speculation about last month's slaying of a popular Danvers High School teacher from Andover, her family continued to ask for privacy.

The family of 24-year-old Colleen Ritzer, who was found dead in a wooded area near Danvers High on Oct. 23, needs time to grieve, their lawyer, Dan Murphy, said this week.

"It's been less than two weeks since this horrible murder of Colleen Ritzer," Murphy told The Salem News, The Andover Townsman's sister paper, on Monday. "This family has endured unbearable pain."

"... All I can say is this family needs time to grieve, and they ought to be afforded that opportunity."

Murphy's comments were made Monday outside Salem District Court, where prosecutors fought to keep most of the details about the case involving Ritzer's 14-year-old student, Philip Chism, who has been charged with first-degree murder, under wraps for at least a few more weeks.

Last week, after officials had met with the Ritzer family to discuss specific details about the crime, prosecutors argued that release of sensitive details in the case "prior to the family's coming to terms with them" would "only increase their pain and anguish."

Family members had asked prosecutors to hold off on a meeting until after Ritzer's burial on Oct. 28.

With few details released by authorities, however, there has been some speculation as to motive.

But during a hearing on a motion by attorneys for several news organizations, including North of Boston Media, The Townsman's media group, to unseal search warrant materials in the case, prosecutor David O'Sullivan said, "There is absolutely no evidence of any misconduct or wrongdoing by Ms. Ritzer."

Lawyers for North of Boston Media as well as The Danvers Herald, the Associated Press and The Boston Globe argued this week that the decision by Salem District Court Judge Michael Lauranzano to seal the documents, including an affidavit detailing evidence in the case, was unjustified under the law, which states that those materials are considered public unless "good cause" is shown for their impoundment.

Michael Grygiel, a lawyer representing The Salem News and several other

organizations, argued that the public has a legitimate interest in learning details about the case given the "epidemic of violence occurring in our schools," something he called a "vital public-safety issue."

But the media attorneys were flanked by two prosecutors, Chism's attorney and a lawyer representing Ritzer's family, all of whom opposed release of the documents.

O'Sullivan on Monday offered to release a redacted version of the documents, but said that prosecutors are concerned that the exposure of witness names, including the names of teenagers, and certain details could affect their testimony before the grand jury and their willingness to testify. He and prosecutor Kate MacDougall are asking that the impoundment be extended at least until Nov. 22, when the grand jury is expected to complete its work.

Grygiel called that argument "entirely speculative," and outside court, he suggested that the students are already very likely discussing the case with each other.

If prosecutors could show a specific concern, argued Andover lawyer Peter Caruso, who represents The Eagle-Tribune and The Townsman, the news organizations would be amenable to having the names of witnesses blacked out.

Grygiel argued that prosecutors have already discussed the details with the family during their meeting last week. And privacy as a grounds for impoundment was rejected by the Supreme Judicial Court during another high-profile Essex County murder case, the 2000 murder of Karen Sharpe by her husband, Dr. Richard Sharpe, in Wenham, when news organizations sought access to the couple's divorce records.

Susan Oker, who is a public defender representing Chism, also argued against the release, but on different grounds, suggesting that not only could "sensational" information taint the potential jury pool, but that some of the information contained in the documents — including Chism's statement to police the night of his arrest — might be inadmissible at trial.

She also argued that Chism's youth should be considered by the judge.

Lauranzano took the request under advisement. There had been no ruling by The Townsman's deadline, but any ruling could be stayed should the district attorney's office or the defense seek to appeal, the judge told the lawyers.

Town deserves answers on wastewater sludge case

To say the battle between Bancroft Road resident James Berberian and the town of Andover over the dumping of wastewater sludge on his property three years ago is a complex, layered, even potentially political charged one is a vast understatement.

Any time a community shells out a reported \$500,00 in legal fees alone to deal with a situation that has resulted in a federal lawsuit, it is going to raise questions among townspeople, if not their ire.

This summer, it looked like a settlement — to the tune of \$440,000 being paid by the town to Berberian — was within reach. That deal, reached through non-binding mediation, was devoid of any admission of liability or wrongful conduct by the town. But Berberian's failure to also reach a separate agreement with a private contractor that had done work on his property, as he had stipulated, squashed the deal.

If one assumes Berberian will settle for no less than that previous \$440,000, the town is looking at being on the hook, at the very least, for \$1 million when all is said and done. And that "when" is still nowhere in sight.

The case dates to November 2010 when Berberian videotaped town Water Department employees cleaning out the 6 million-gallon water storage tank at Bancroft School. His video shows them dumping dark-colored water into leaking trucks and into a nearby storm drain. That drain flowed down Bancroft Road and onto Berberian's property at the corner of South Main Street adjacent to Phillips Academy.

The brownish water contained dark sediment that ended up settling in about an acre of wetlands on Berberian's property. When that sediment was tested, he says it showed high levels of toxic metals, including arsenic, cadmium and nickel.

After months of failing to get the attention and answers he expected from town officials, Berberian filed a federal lawsuit in February 2012.

In recent weeks, Berberian has become increasingly vocal about the case, bringing his story to the local and Boston media and demanding that he be heard at public meetings, as he was this past Monday night when he secured a 15-minute time slot during the public comment period on the Board of Selectmen's agenda.

Allegations of cover-up and malfeasance were banded about by Berberian as he highlighted key reports, correspondence and other materials he has compiled. He contends those documents clearly show that town officials have admitted fault and have skirted their responsibility and liability, all while putting the health of his family, including several children, as well as the greater community at risk.

Berberian asserts that the town's own reports and paid employees have acknowledged higher than allowable levels of arsenic — in one case two times the imminent health hazard level, he says — in the water coming out of the Bancroft water tank.

For selectmen's part, they say the matter is in litigation, which prevents them from discussing it in detail. But selectmen Chairman Alex Vispoli did read a statement Monday night following Berberian's presentation that said it is not uncommon for sediment to build up in large water tanks such as the 6 million-gallon Bancroft one.

But pointing to an October 2011 report and other testing that has been conducted, Vispoli asserted the town is confident the drinking water consistently being supplied to Andover residents "has been tested and found to meet standards set" by the state Department of Environmental Protection and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Why, then, has this matter dragged on for three years? No one agrees to hand over close to \$1/2 million to settle a case if one doesn't exist in some fashion.

It is hard for us to imagine any town official in Andover would knowingly put the health of the people they are elected to serve at risk. It's hard, too, to imagine they wouldn't take claims to the contrary seriously, even if they consider them to be entirely without merit.

Still, plenty of questions have been raised and doubt has been cast. In our eyes, the burden of proof rests with the selectmen as the town's elected leaders. They owe it to assure residents that when they go to pour a glass of water from their faucets for their children, they never have to think twice about whether it's safe.

A whole lot of shaking going on

I've been thinking about earthquakes. There were a couple late last year. The first was a 4.5 on the Richter

scale, causing our dogs to bark and us to bolt from our chairs. We felt the house move. The second quake was smaller, but a bathroom cabinet fell from our wall.

My wife, who is from Berkeley, Calif., has experienced numerous earthquakes, the most famous being the "World Series" quake in 1989, which struck as the game was beginning in San Francisco. Fear was in the announcers' voices as the stadium shook. The quake measured 6.9, but was especially dangerous because of its side-to-side motion. My wife was driving on a freeway and says that it was like being hit by ocean waves from opposite sides at the same time. She thought she'd lost a wheel, and when she pulled over to check, a pickup drove by and someone yelled, "It's an earthquake, you idiot."

Fifty-seven people were killed.

The Richter scale is difficult for me to figure out. According to the U.S. Geological Survey, a 4.5 can be recorded by seismographs (earthquake-measuring instruments) around the world. Its website says, "Each whole number increase in magnitude represents a tenfold increase in measured amplitude..." The explanation gets confusing from there, so let me put it this way: each whole number is wicked worse than the preceding whole number.

Earthquakes aren't rare here. In fact, in geologic time, we live in a place where earthquakes are common. We can expect a moderate to strong one because of our past history. In 1638 and again in 1663, there were major earthquakes. The first one struck before Andover was settled. However, early settlers in Newbury were terrified by the four-minute quake. It knocked them down, scared their farm animals and caused widespread destruction. Settlers probably had second thoughts about their recent move to the New World.

The 1663 quake was more destructive because of its size — Canada to Mexico — and intensity. It destroyed or damaged almost every Boston building.

On Oct. 29, 1727, the Merrimack Valley was clobbered by an earthquake, and days of prayer ensued. It was the worst earthquake to hit New England since its settlement, although it was not part of the "worldwide convulsions" that had accompanied other New England earthquakes. ("Historic Storms of New England," Sidney Perley, 1891, reprinted in 2001 by Memoirs Unlimited, Inc.)

Many other earthquakes were felt in New England, but the only one I'll add to the list is the earthquake of 1755, which was described as very severe. Having occurred at 4 a.m., it caused a Rev. Sewall (a descendant of the repentant witch-baiter Samuel Sewall) to preach, "Lest coming suddenly he find you sleeping" (Perley). That sure made folks feel better.

In early New England days, smaller but noted earthquakes were frequent, perhaps as many as several

a year. In the last 100 years, only three, possibly four, have been noticeably felt, with the most significant being an earthquake and aftershock centered near Lake Ossipee, N.H., in 1940. Both were estimated at 5.5, although the aftershock caused more damage. It was felt from Quebec to Rhode Island. In 1963, some folks in Andover were slightly shaken by a small quake centered in Somerville.

Closer to the present, earthquakes that could be felt have been rare. I have felt only three in my life, including the two last year, but that's not necessarily good news. In fact, this region is considered to be overdue for a moderate to significant earthquake — remember, we are talking about geologic events, so "overdue" doesn't necessarily mean "imminent." It also means it could happen tomorrow, so keep your shoes near your bed and pick out a strong doorway for cover.

Retirees deserve a cost-of-living boost to pensions

The Andover Contributory Retirement Board, the Andover Board of Selectmen and the Andover Finance Committee must argue forcefully and with moral conviction before the annual Town Meeting to raise the cost-of-living adjustment base for the town's retirees from the current \$12,000 to \$14,000.

Currently in Andover, the public-sector retirement system applies the cost-of-living adjustment raise only to the first \$12,000 of the pension benefit and is limited to 3 percent of the inflation rate. The cost-of-living adjustment is applied to the full amount of the Social Security benefit and the entire inflation rate.

Massachusetts public-sector employees currently pay more into the retirement system than the Social Security tax. Under Massachusetts law, public-sector employees appointed to their position after Jan. 1, 1984, pay 8 percent of their weekly pay plus 2 percent of any amount earned above \$577 a week. Those appointed after July 1, 1996, pay 9 percent of their weekly pay, and the additional 2 percent. The majority of current public employees are paying 11 percent of their weekly pay for retirement purposes and that is exceedingly far greater than the 6 percent Social Security tax. In Andover, public employees are paying more than \$3 million a year into

the town's retirement system

Generally, a private-sector employee's retirement benefits package is greater than the public-sector employees' retirement benefits. Municipalities in this commonwealth do not contribute into the Social Security program. Therefore, public employees in Massachusetts cannot collect Social Security benefits pursuant to the federal pension offset statute. Private-sector employees, however, can collect Social Security payments, employer-funded pension plans and employer-funded 401(k) savings accounts.

Most neighboring communities have increased their pension cost-of-living base: North Reading, Wilmington, Tewksbury, Dracut and Methuen are all at \$14,000; North Andover is at \$13,000.

Public-sector employees also are being treated inequitably and disparately in this commonwealth compared to other New England states. New Hampshire, Vermont, New York, Connecticut and Rhode Island all contribute into the Social Security system for their public employees. Public employees in those states can collect Social Security payments upon retirement at the proper age. Those states also have a tax-funded retirement system. In New Hampshire, public employees' pensions are calculated utilizing salaries, paid details and overtime.

The town of Andover is in an exceptionally strong position to pay for a small increase to the retirement benefits. The town has an enormous amount of free cash; the total free

cash is clearly in excess of \$12.7 million. The small pension increase cost represents less than 1 percent of the free cash. The town of Andover does not pay into a 401(k) saving programs for the employees, currently does not pay the Social Security tax of 6.25 percent and has an excellent credit rating.

Andover's selectmen and Finance Committee must apply objective and intelligent logic to raising retirees' cost-of-living base. The proposed \$60 a year, or \$5 per month, is morally compelling and clearly logical. This reasonable, proper increase in pension benefits cost is rationally balanced between the current employees and the taxpayer.

Additionally, pursuant to federal law, the town of Andover is potentially mandated to pay the Social Security tax on paid details, bonuses and overtime. Whereas, public-sector wage supplements are not included in the calculation for pension benefits purposes under state law. That tax is currently not being paid. In the event Andover did pay the Social Security tax, then the federal government pension offset statute would not apply and the town's employees could collect Social Security benefits.

Here's one theater opening Andover audiences won't want to be late for.

Andover Youth Services, which recently took over the fledgling local performance group, TheatreWorks, is staging the junior version of the whimsical Disney classic "Alice in Wonderland."

The play, which features young cast members from every elementary and middle school in Andover,

"This show is particularly fun with the bright colors, familiar music and unique costumes and characters," says local mother Kim Sousa, of Andover, whose daughter, Farrah, is in the show.

"Alice" is the first production since Andover Youth Services assumed the reigns of TheatreWorks, which was started by three local women who were veterans of Merrimack Valley Jr. Theater.

AYS Director Bill Fahey recruited Amy Wilkins Blanchette of Andover, who is well known in the local theater community, to direct the show.

Blanchette, who has a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in musical theater from

Elon University in North Carolina, is a proud alumna of Merrimack Valley Jr. Theater. She says that she is flattered she was tapped for the job.

"I'm so happy to be able to give back to the community that gave so much to me," Blanchette says in a release.

Blanchette, who was last seen on stage herself in this fall's ACT Theater Company production of "Les Misérables" at the Collins Center in Andover, says she finds herself channeling MJT Artistic Director Josie Walker during rehearsals.

"I constantly hear the legendary Mrs. Walker in my head when I work with the kids, but I really wish I could whistle like her when getting the kids' attention," says

While Blanchette is directing and choreographing the show, she reached out to Andover High School senior Carter Letsky to do music direction.

"Carter is very talented," Blanchette says. "He's an amazing piano player and stage performer himself He has really risen to the occasion and the kids love him."


Of course, the kids are also fans of their director, says Sousa, who calls Blanchette "a true professional."



imagery literally — as in birds, frogs, cats, moths or simply animals coming into being — or traces of animals and their dwellings through atmosphere or light.

As curator, Krendel selected works that convey a sense of magic, mystery and/or transformation bringing to mind the visual poetry of dreams.

In addition to Krendel's watercolors, the show includes paintings by Elizabeth Awalt and Susan Heidem, sculpture by Steve

Hollinger and Anne Oldach, woodcut prints and poems by Jenny Lawton Grassl as well as the light installations of artist Beth Galston.

"I've been working on this exhibit since November 2012 — having the pleasure of meeting and visiting with the artists in and out of their studios," Krendel says in a release. "I chose work that is not only marvelous singularly, but works in concert — complementing and enhancing the other artwork in obvious and nuanced ways to create the total dreamscape environment

of 'Animals: Dreamed & Dreaming.'"

Animals are also featured in the association's pop-up case in the association's smaller gallery. That display includes the popular clay dog sculptures of former Andover resident and devoted animal lover Carolyn Bonier, who recently moved to Lawrence.

Cut paper pieces by Pai-Fang Lin are also shown in the display case. And Nat Marden's unicorn statue of vines and wires is displayed outside in the gardens of Concord Art's historic

building.

At an opening reception for the exhibit on Oct. 19, Krendel's husband, David Clark, a jazz musician who teaches at Berklee School of Music in Boston, provided live jazz accompaniment.

The exhibit runs through Nov. 24 at the Concord Art Association, 37 Lexington Road, Concord. The featured artists will participate in a "behind the scenes" panel discussion on Thursday, Nov. 7, from 7 to 9 p.m.

**50 Years Ago
Nov. 7, 1963**

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff is pinning his hopes for capital expenditures,

particularly in the building line, on additional revenue from new buildings in town. In a frank approach to the 1964 financial outlook, Duff told selectmen Monday night that only the revenue from new construction can offset a sizable increase in the rate.

An entertainment license has been issued for Forum V on Essex Street by a 3-2 vote of the selectmen. Favoring the license were Chairman James D. Wilson and Selectmen Phillip K. Allen and Paul W. Cronin. Voting in opposition were Selectmen Robert A. Watters and William Stewart. Nancy V. Mundy and Eleanor P. Hoag, who operate the establishment, said it is planned to have folk singing.

**25 Years Ago
Nov. 10, 1988**

Andover voters turned out in full force to cast ballots in Tuesday's election. The turnout, about 89 percent, was higher than expected, according to Town Clerk Elden Salter, who said the voting process ran smoothly in both Dunn Gymnasium and the Andover Senior Center. Roll up the sleeves for flu clinics

The Andover Health Division offers its first of two flu clinics this month on Thursday, Nov. 7, between 4 and 7 p.m. at West Middle School.

A second clinic for ages 2 and older takes place Monday, Nov. 18, from 4 to 7 p.m. at the Center at Punchard (senior center) on Whittier Court.

Vaccinations are provided for free, although individuals who supply

insurance information will allow the Health Division to bill the provider for the costs incurred and those reimbursements will then be used to purchase vaccine for the following flu season.

The traditional intramuscular shot and the nasal spray (FluMist) will be available at both clinics as well as a limited amount of high-dose vaccine for residents ages 65 and up. FluMist

is recommended for medically eligible people between the ages of 2 and 49.

Local woman earns historians' book awards

Study on French Guiana wins top prizes

Miranda Frances Spieler, associate professor of history at the American University of Paris, has been selected as the winner of the American Historical Association's 2013 J. Russell Major Prize and 2013 George L. Mosse prize for her book, "Empire and Underworld: Captivity in French Guiana" (Harvard Univ. Press, 2012).

The AHA is the largest organization of historians in the U.S. Its J. Russell Major Prize is awarded annually for the best work in English on any aspect of French history. The George L. Mosse Prize is awarded annually for an outstanding major work of extraordinary scholarly distinction, creativity and originality in the intellectual and cultural history of Europe since 1500.

Both prizes will be awarded during a ceremony at the association's 128th Annual Meeting in Washington, D.C., Jan. 2 through 5.

The daughter of longtime Andover residents Dr. Phyllis Spieler and Dr. Paul Spieler, Spieler was singled out for her "innovative" research.

"Miranda Spieler's innovative study of French Guiana from the late 18th century to 1870 examines the spatial and legal history of the colony in ways that invite a profound reconsideration of the relationship of France to its colonial territories," Katherine B. Crawford, chairwoman of the 2013 Major Prize, said in a release.

"Analyzing material and cultural remains, as well as silences and lacunae in the record, Spieler elegantly challenges many presumptions about nation, empire, slavery, incarceration and violence."

Spieler graduated from Phillips Academy in Andover in 1989 and went on to Harvard University, where she

earned her degree magna cum laude in history and literature with a focus on Germany and France.

Before she enrolled in graduate school, she worked as the personal assistant to writer Susan Sontag in New York. She continued her work with Sontag while earning her Ph.D. in history from Columbia University in New York in 2005.

Spieler moved to Tucson, Ariz., in fall 2005 and became assistant professor at the University of Arizona. She was named an associate professor on receiving tenure in 2011. She has also served as a lecturer at Columbia, Wesleyan University in Connecticut and in the Committee on Degrees in history and literature at Harvard.

In August, Spieler moved to Paris with her daughter, Althea, and took a

permanent position as associate professor at the American University of Paris to facilitate her work on several projects, which she says requires more archival research than she can complete on her one- or two-month summer trips to Paris.

She is currently working on a book about slaves living in Paris during the 18th century.

The J. Russell Major prize was established in memory of J. Russell Major, a distinguished scholar of French history who served on the history faculty at Emory University in Georgia from 1949 until his retirement in 1990. The George L. Mosse Prize was established in honor of George Lachmann Mosse, American cultural historian, with funds donated by former students, colleagues and friends of the late Dr. Mosse.

Spieler's book was selected for the J. Russell Major Prize by a review committee comprised of American Historical Association members including Crawford (Vanderbilt University in Tennessee), Todd Shepard (Johns Hopkins University in Maryland) and Leslie Tuttle (University of Kansas). The George L. Mosse prize review committee that also selected Spieler's book as its top choice included AHA members chairwoman Tracie M. Matysik (University of Texas, Austin), Brad S. Gregory (University of Notre Dame in Indiana), and Harry Liebersohn (University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign).

The American Historical Association is a nonprofit membership organization founded in 1884 and incorporated by Congress in 1889 for the promotion of historical studies. The AHA is comprised of more than 14,000 members and serves historians representing every historical period and geographical area. Visit www.historians.org for more.

Andover runner tackles NYC Marathon

While many residents were still saluting the World Series-winning Red Sox last weekend, there was a marathon happening in New York City with a little taste of Andover: Jennifer McDonald, who grew up in town and graduated from Andover High School in 2006 before going on to Boston University, ran the ING New York City Marathon on behalf of Boston Children's Hospital on Sunday, Nov. 3.

McDonald, who now lives in New York City and works at AMC Entertainment, says the cause "is very near and dear to the hearts of those born and raised in and around Boston."

"BCH is currently the No. 1 pediatric hospital in the world, housing over 8,000 kids yearly who are struggling to reach their next birthday. I feel especially fortunate to be able to represent my home cities, both past and present, after the senseless act of violence that occurred earlier this year," McDonald wrote on her Facebook fundraising page.

McDonald, the daughter of John and Lisa McDonald of Durham Drive, raised \$3,000 for BCH. She ran the 26.2 miles in a very respectable time of four hours and 14 minutes. The New York City Marathon followed her outing last year in the Boston Marathon on behalf of the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, for which she raised \$5,000.

"They are both such amazing causes so I'm very happy," McDonald wrote in an email.

WEEK OF A LIFETIME

Nicholas soaks in World Series win, then delivers career day on gridiron

In the world of sports, it may be impossible to top the three-day stretch Andover High's Christopher Nicholas experienced last week.

Last Wednesday, Nicholas was at Fenway Park, sitting on the third base line as his beloved Red Sox clinched the World Series title with a dominant victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

Two days later, Nicholas was back at Eugene V. Lovely Field, delivering the game of his career with two touchdowns and two interceptions as the Golden Warriors blasted Lawrence.

"It was a lot of fun," Nicholas said. "To go out there and play like that was amazing, and being at Fenway for the World Series was unforgettable."


It was the culmination of a breakout season for the Golden Warrior receiver/defensive back, who is thrilled to finally be sharing the experience with his father, John Nicholas, who has served in the U.S. Army since he was 17 years old.

"It's been rough having father in the military," Nicholas said. "But I look up to him every day and he is truly my hero."

Christopher Nicholas' connection to sports — and Fenway Park — date back even before he was born. His parents met at Who's On First, a bar that sits across the street from the beloved Red Sox ballpark.

The younger Nicholas grew up dedicated to playing football and baseball, and rooting for the Red Sox. But it was often without his father, who was frequently deployed overseas, including a trip to Afghanistan as part of "Operation Enduring Freedom."

"He was deployed several times," Nicholas said. "The worst was when he was sent to Afghanistan and Kuwait, because he was gone for a whole year. That was when I was in middle school. Most of the time when he was deployed, he would be able to come home for a few weeks to visit and then be home for the summer."

"It is so hard to grow up without your dad at such a young age when you have questions and need advice. I really missed him. But with the help of my family and friends, I got through it pretty well. And I admire what he did for the country so much."

As he matured, Nicholas also began to emerge as an athlete. A season ago, he played receiver for the Andover High JV team. Over the summer, he set his sights on becoming an impact player on the varsity team.

"I was really determined to be as productive as I could be this year," he said. "But I didn't know it would happen as


quickly as it did."

In Week 1 of this season, Nicholas caught the game-winning, overtime touchdown pass from Oliver Eberth that gave the Warriors a victory over North Andover.

"I was shocked," Nicholas said. "I couldn't believe I had done that. It didn't sink in for a while. It was just amazing to make that kind of play."

Nicholas has continued to impress at receiver, leading the team in catches (18) and receiving yards (247) and touchdown catches (5), and also at defensive

always remember it."

Two days later, he made more amazing memories, this time on the field.

Against Lawrence, the Golden Warrior receiver caught five passes for a whopping 112 yards and two touchdowns, both from E.J. Perry IV, and caught a two-point conversion on a halfback pass from Jack Sylvester.
