Former Andover star revisits Fenway Park as a major leaguer

Andover's Ryan Hanigan already had registered 494 games as a Major League player during his stellar big league career. But last Tuesday was special.

Game No. 495 — for the first time in his career — was at Fenway Park.

"Fenway Park is the cathedral (of baseball)," Hanigan said. "Everyone in New England loves the Red Sox, and I went to so many games here growing up. To have the chance to play at Fenway, in front of my family and so many friends, is really exciting."

On April 29, Hanigan took the field at iconic Fenway Park for the first time in his eight-year MLB career, as the starting catcher for the Tampa Bay Rays. "Fenway is such a special

place," Hanigan's mother, Helen, said. "We used to bring Ryan here as a kid so often, so to see him on the field as a major leaguer is very, very exciting.

"His (Major League) debut was so special, but this is right up there with that day."

The former Andover High star lived out every Boston sports fans' dream last week. He not only started a Major League game at Fenway with more than 102 friends and family on hand to root him on — but he hammered a line drive RBI single off the park's iconic Green Monster during his debut against the team he grew up rooting for.

"We are so thrilled for him," his father, Mike Hanigan, said. "The first game I ever brought him to, Roger Clemens pitched a shutout. That was a long time ago. Ryan is a mature, experienced major league player now. It's amazing to see him here."

Despite a lengthy and productive Major League career since his debut on Sept. 9, 2007, Hanigan had never first seven years of his career were spent with the Cincinnati Reds of the National League. The Reds never played an interleague series against the Red Sox during Hanigan's time there.

However, in the off-season, Hanigan was traded by the Reds to the Tampa Bay Rays.

So, the former Golden Warrior and Rollins College star would not only visit Fenway, but he will take on his hometown team 19 times during the 2014 season.

and two-time American League Manager of the Year Joe Maddon.

"Ryan has been a very refreshing addition to this team," Maddon said. "I love the way he goes about his business. He cares as much as anyone could care about the game. His attention to the pitching staff is incredible. The thought that he will be here for three more years is great because he is very, very good."





Fenway memories

While Hanigan had never played a professional game at Fenway Park until last week, he is no stranger to the 102-year-old ballpark.

"I went to so many games when I was young," he said. "I would go to the park with friends and family, catch a game then go out afterward. Ever since I was a little kid, it was a great place to watch a game, and I loved the Red

His mother remembers her son's excitement of going to Fenway as a kid.

"Fenway is a very special place to us because we live so close," she said. "We have been looking forward to him playing at Fenway for a long time."

Hanigan actually had taken the field at Fenway Park twice before, prior to his professional baseball career.

"I actually played there once in high school for a Mass. state team against Connecticut," he said. "Then I played for the Cape Cod All-Star team. I had the chance to walk around the field, and it was special."

After outstanding careers at Andover High (.397 as a senior) and Rollins in Florida (fifth in school history with a .358 average) and a breakthrough performance in the Cape Cod League, Hanigan was signed by the Reds as an undrafted free agent.

"Although now we like to think of him as a Tampa Bay Ray, he kind of epitomizes what this city (of Boston)

is all about," Longoria said, adding, "He's a hard worker."

Hanigan may be known for his intense "game face," but he could not hide his excitement for his return to

"I have been around the majors for a long time and things," he said. "But this is definitely cool. It definitely feels like a home crowd for me. This is special."

Hanigan ended up starting two of the three games in the series against the Red Sox. He expects to see more action when he returns to Fenway on May 30.

"We have really been looking forward to this season,' Hanigan's father said. "We went to a lot of games over the years, but having him this close to home in the AL East is great. We can travel up the East Coast watching him play, and he will be back at Fenway."







> Andover police Sgt. Steven Gerroir said he first saw the motorcycle heading north on Route 28 near Shawsheen Plaza around 1:30 p.m. last Friday, May 2. Gerroir said he was alerted to the operator because of "wheelies and speed."

Gerroir followed the red motorcycle up Route 28 toward Elm Square, but the man turned off onto Route 133/Lowell Street, heading toward North Andover. Then Gerroir said he lost sight of

Other officers picked up the chase of the motorcycle, which several people said was extremely loud as it sped through the back streets of

The operator then turned off Route 133 onto High Street, and eventually ended up on Washington Street heading south. He turned again on Summer Street and made a quick turn onto Avon Street.

As he was driving down Avon Street, headed toward Chestnut Street, detective Peter Reming turned onto Avon, heading right for him.

According to police safety officer Charles Edgerly, the operator then put the bike on its side and slid to a stop just before hitting Reming's SUV.

Reming said it was "coincidence" that he was turning onto Avon Street at the same time the motorcycle was driving down the street.

Gerroir said it was "amazing (the suspect) didn't cause any other accidents" the way he was driving.

Edgerly said police would have to get a warrant to view the video that was captured on the camera.





Plenty of good to be found in Sunday's Step Up for Colleen 5K

Cheers to the thousands of walkers and runners who turned out Sunday to honor the memory of murdered teacher Colleen Ritzer.

Some 4,000 walkers and runners participated in the first Step Up for Colleen 5K memorial road race through town. Proceeds from the event will go to a scholarship fund in the Andover teacher's memory. The fund will be used to support aspiring teachers.

Ritzer, 24, was a math teacher at Danvers High. She was killed in October; police have charged her student, now-15-year-old Philip Chism, with her murder.

Many of those who turned out for the event are themselves teachers.

"She was just an amazing person and an amazing math teacher," Amy Keough, a firstgrade teacher in Stow who knew Ritzer, told reporter Jill Harmacinski. Ritzer had taught briefly in Stow and Keough's daughter had her as a teacher.

High school students from throughout the region also participated in the race.

Danvers High School's a cappella group sang for the participants as they waited and then sang the national anthem at the race's start.

Family friend Nina Caron, a competitive runner herself, was struck with the idea to organize a race in the days following Ritzer's murder. Her need to act turned into a unifying opportunity for people from all corners of Ritzer's life to come together over a shared grief and desire to create some good out of the tragedy.

But it's evident there's still much healing to be done. The anguish could still be seen on the faces of Ritzer's immediate family as her father addressed the crowd of participants before Sunday's race began.

Despite the pain, the family saw the importance of thanking those who have supported and stood by them through their darkest times. And they stood tall as they acknowledged that knowing that their daughter and sister had touched so many lives had been an immense source of pride for them.

"We are very proud of Colleen and continue to be amazed at the number of lives she touched," Colleen's father, Thomas Ritzer, said, thanking all racers for their participation.

"Colleen wasn't much of an athlete, but she sure would have loved being part of something like this."

Ritzer was known for her inspirational tweets to her students. One of her last has become a mantra often repeated over the last six months: "Every day may not be good, but there is something good in every day." That sentiment was clearly evident in many ways all along the 5K course on Sunday.

The turnout for the race was indeed impressive and a fitting tribute to the impact Colleen Ritzer had on others during her too-short life. Well done to all who participated.

Thirty years ago, in the early days of my newspaper column, I received a letter from Nancy Blanchette, a reader who lived in Merrimac. She was originally from Andover, and her father, Harry Hyland, used to own a shoe store where the old Ford's Restaurant was - now a coffee and bagel store. Mrs.

Blanchette reminded me about the "Little Store." Then she wrote about a similar store near the Little two stores were only a few Store. She wrote, "A house on Summer Street near Elm (in Andover) had a little convenience store in the front room. The candy case was a winner — beer barrels, lime balls, Mary Janes and Boston-baked beans (candy-covered peanuts) that the proprietor would scoop out of

a jar with a tiny wooden

barrel (that would be a

I called Mrs. Blanchette and she said the store was on the right-hand side of Summer Street a couple of houses up from the intersection with Elm. She said that they used to stop in on their way from school and stock up on candy and that it felt kind of funny going into someone's house to buy things.

The little store I went to was on the corner of Summer and Washington streets. We entered off Washington, although the house itself faces Summer. When you look at the house today, you can see where the store was. The minutes' walk from each other, but I'm not sure they operated at the same time. I wonder how many of these little house-stores existed in Andover's neighborhoods. They must have carried the same items: milk, bread, butter, magazines, tobacco products, newspapers and, of course, candy

and ice cream bars. The stores were a major

convenience to a society that lived in a time when a family was lucky to have one car. And there is no question how much the kids enjoyed them. Very often, at the beginning of a weekend day, I'd get a call from a friend saying he'd meet me at the Little Store in 15 minutes. We'd both hope the other might have a few pennies for an early-morning sugar hit.

As has become the case in recent years, in order to find old-style neighborhoods, you have to travel to the city where small stores — not necessarily chain stores — still exist and the clerk knows who you are. In suburban places like Andover, the advent of the second family car allowed for groceries to be more often purchased in bulk; the little stores disappeared and zoning laws assured they'd never return.

The stone around the playstead will be straightened out, and the board is also working with the railroad on a plan to rectify the bumps at the Vale crossing.

In an endeavor to cut its budget to get it down to the Town Meeting appropriation, the board decided to close North School for which an extra \$500 was appropriated specifically at the meeting. This move obviated the necessity of combining grades in Shawsheen and in

Coaching honors for Andover's Vadala

Tracy Vadala made her mark in high school softball as part of the great dynasty at Salem, N.H.

Where do you get all the energy? "I don't know. My mom was like that

and my kids are like that. I'm a Gemini — half is all sports and the other half is the art field. I used to do fine arts, so I could buy a scuba tank so I could go diving.'

Why do you love swimming so much? "I have a hard time answering it. I can't stand not moving around. I've always been involved in the sport."

How did you get into swimming? "I"man only child. There weren't too many things you did. Growing up in Lawrence, there were city pools. It was a great way to keep active in the summer."

How long have you been a competitive swimmer? "Since 15. I was working for the city pools in Lawrence. I ended up being an instructor and a lifeguard. I started coaching at the Lawrence Y. I was probably 17 or 18. I've coached forever. Mostly Andover High. That was the most fun I ever had. Marilyn (Fitzgerald) took over for me when I went back to art school.'






