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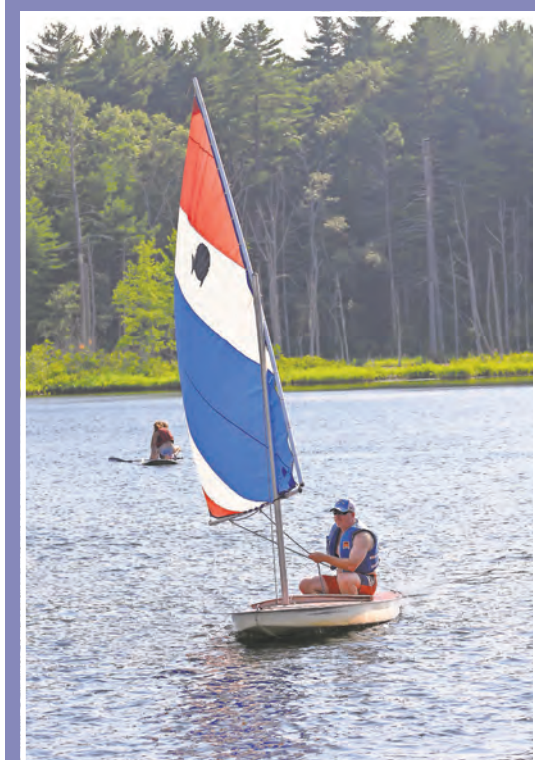

## Drug battle in high gear

### Chief: Town needs help in fight against opiate addiction

Faced with seven opiate overdose deaths so far this year, Andover plans on taking some bold steps to combat the problem.

Police Chief Patrick Keefe told the Board of Selectmen on Tuesday morning that the town needs to hire two new people - a program coordinator to spearhead education and awareness, and a clinician to focus on prevention and treatment.

“This is an epidemic that we have not seen before,” Keefe told Selectmen in a meeting that was attended by 3 selectmen, the fire chief, the interim school

## New preschool targets South Main Street

### Primrose proposes 189-child center on synagogue land

A 12,000-square-foot, child-care facility for nearly 200 infants and toddlers is eyeing the South Main Street property now occupied by Congregation Beth Israel synagogue.

Primrose Schools, a Georgia-based private preschool franchise, is proposing to open its latest Massachusetts location on the site.

Congregation Beth Israel, meanwhile, is building a new synagogue on Boutwell Road and the sale of its South Main Street property is crucial to completion of the project, leaders say.

Last week, town planning officials

## Rocket man

### Andover chemist has early hand in space exploration

Dick Gannon marvels with everyone else at the latest eye-popping images of Pluto arriving from the New Horizons spacecraft — and feels a little pride in any new NASA accomplishment.

Greater Andover can take pride in these accomplishments, too.

Gannon was part of a team of scientists whose breakthrough nose cone research helped clear a path for NASA’s manned space flights and ongoing space exploration.

And much of that nose cone testing work took place in Lawrence in an old mill.

Gannon, now 87, who with his wife, Barbara, raised five children in Andover, went to work in 1956 for an aerospace company, the Avco Corporation, in Lawrence at the Wood Mill.

The Wood Mill was built by the

American Woolen Company in 1905, at the time the largest mill in the world. Later, as textile work moved elsewhere, the mill space found new uses, some of it in advanced technology.

When Gannon, a chemist, worked at the Wood Mill, lanolin still dripped from beams, a remnant of wool production many years before, he said.

In their work, the Avco team, under the leadership of Arthur Kantrowitz, developed a nose cone material, silica, placed in a honeycomb design that allowed a spacecraft or missile to re-enter the Earth’s atmosphere without burning up and destroying the payload.

Later, one payload would become astronauts as manned flights took to space in the 1960s. Other payloads were nuclear weapons in intercontinental ballistic missiles. Avco did defense and space-related work.

“Tonight Show” fame.

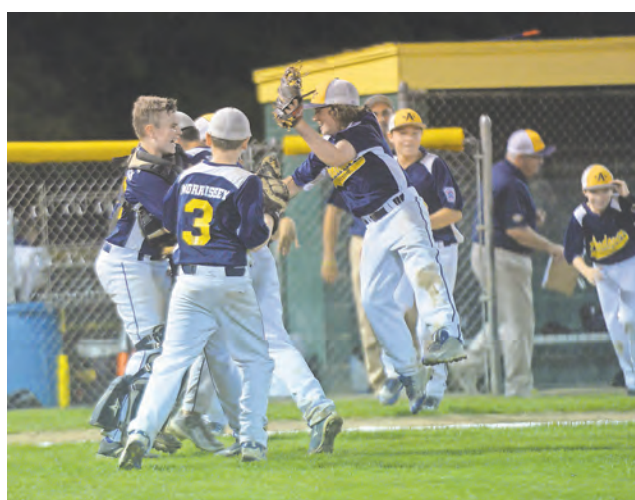
### Working overtime

superintendent, the new high school principal, representatives of Memorial Hall Library and other town leaders.

Nationwide, overdoses from prescription painkillers and heroin have quadrupled from 1999 to 2013. As of May 12, 2015, just in Andover, the number of opiate overdoses has already surpassed the number of opiate overdoses in all of 2014.

“As of right now we are at 33 overdoses,” Keefe said. “Twelve have been from residents of our town from 9 different people, resulting in 7 deaths.”

The chief’s proposal drew a lot of questions regarding funding and who would be eligible for treatment and how they would pay for it.

When Selectman Chairwoman Mary O’Donoghue asked if this plan would help those under 18, Keefe said this plan is “multi-generational, for all ages.”

Keefe said there are facilities that specialize in juveniles, and the clinician would steer those patients and their families in the right direction.

Regarding how to fund this plan, O’Donoghue questioned if the Greater Lawrence Coalition would grant them access to some of the grant funds that organization has obtained. Keefe said that there are five communities involved with the coalition, including Andover, but that they have not decided where the funds will go other than that they may be used for regional education efforts.

O’Donoghue said she believes the town may be able to fund the two positions.

“I do feel confident that we can find a way,” she said.

Selectman Paul Salafia brought up the problems with the detox process such as relapsing, transportation and treatment issues. Keefe assured him that the clinician would assist in getting addicts the help they needed by scheduling stints in rehab immediately after detox and arranging any transportation needed.

“Afterwards, where is the next step?” Salafia questioned.

Keefe said when the addicts come out of detox and rehab, the community comes into play.

“We need to have some kind of program to feel

welcomed, come back and there is no stigma,” Chief Keefe said.

The Selectmen unanimously voted to move forward with the plan. For their next meeting, Aug. 10, selectmen hope to find a

potential financial solution and create a formal job description.

“We need to get moving quickly,” Salafia said. “We’re losing one kid a month.”

Just two weeks ago the

first meeting was called to discuss the issue, during which Keefe discussed the enforcement side of the issue.

“We’ve been pretty active on that, but there are a couple of sides that are missing,” he said, noting that the department has two drug detectives and a patrolman assigned to drug cases.

After the initial meeting, Keefe spoke with or met other police chiefs to come up with a broader strategic plan to fight the problem.

He is at least partly modeling the Andover plan on a plan put forth by Gloucester Police Chief Lenny Campanello, who created the Angel Program that assists addicts rather than arresting them.

The Addiction Clinician would assist the community by creating an outreach program that accesses addiction treatment options and resources. They would reach out to the addicts and their families to develop a plan that would ensure their survival and help them with the long term recovery process.

The Addiction Clinician especially would work off hours and would need to be accessible 24/7.

The program

coordinator, meanwhile, would educate and raise awareness within the community. This person would work with all of the town’s departments to identify the needs and concerns, and would create innovative ways to spread education.

According to Chief Keefe, both positions would be full-time.

“I feel there is a need for it,” he said. “I think the good thing is to have a schedule that people are comfortable going in and looking for help, but also, those people who need help right away at one o’clock in the morning, they need that access.”

On Wednesday, Aug. 26 the Andover Police Department and the Greater Lawrence Family Health Center

will be hosting a public overdose education training. The training, which is free and open to the public, will be conducted by members of the Greater Lawrence Family Health Center.

The program will focus on how family and friends can recognize the signs of addiction, how to prevent overdoses and what to do if one occurs. Calling 9-1-1, how to perform rescue breathing and how to administer NARCAN will also be covered.

began to learn more about Primrose Schools’ plans.

The educational child-care provider has about 300 franchised centers across the country, including one in Burlington and another currently in the licensing

process in Natick.

According to Ted Tillman, senior project manager at Primrose Schools Franchising Company, the Andover location at 503 South Main St. would accommodate 189 children, infants to preschoolers. It would be open Monday to Friday, from 6 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Plans call for a single-story, modern facility, roughly 1 1/2 times the size of the current synagogue, surrounded by several enclosed play areas for children.

Attorney Mark Broblowski of Blatman, Broblowski and Mead, LLC in Concord, who is representing Primrose Schools, said that the current synagogue building would be unfit to transition to a child-care facility because it’s outdated and has several components unsafe for young children.

Founded in 1982, Primrose Schools credits itself

Piotr Siwik, a neighbor to the proposed property

with “revolutionizing” the concept of child care by straying from the conventional “all-play and nothing-but-play” norm to a more educational experience for young children, according to its website.

Congregation Beth Israel administrator Amy Sherr said last week that a purchase-and-sale agreement is in place with Primrose Schools, contingent on approval of its plans.

The sale will allow Congregation Beth Israel to create a new home that’s more centrally located to its two original congregations in Andover and Lowell. The synagogue was established in 2004 by combining Lowell’s Temple Beth El and Andover’s Tifereth Israel, according to Beth Israel’s website. Today, Beth Israel is an egalitarian conservative synagogue.

However, some have questioned the need for a new child-care center,

noting that there are three other ones already established on South Main Street within 1 mile of the proposed Primrose site: Kindercare, Next Generation and Andover School of Montessori.

Andrea Stidsen of Canterbury Street said that she values the importance of child-care facilities, and even enrolled her daughter in one, but is concerned with the day-to-day traffic to the area if a new facility is erected.

“I’m just wondering what the traffic will be like,” she said. “You already have three, and now four programs all clustered in the same area. The time of day they come and go is the same.”

However, Tillman said that his organization would be different, and better, than the others.

“We have done a demographic study of the area, and we look at the need for

certain aged children in this type of facility,” Tillman told the Planning Board. “We feel that we offer a better curriculum than our competitors.”

Piotr Siwik of 497 South Main St., a neighbor to the proposed property, said noise is a concern for him.

“So many kids, all day,” he said. “That’s a lot of noise. I built this place and it’s nice and quiet right now, but 200 kids? All day? It’s going to be, I believe, a lot of noise. That’s my concern about it.”

Proponents of the new center are working within the confines of the state’s Dover Amendment, which restricts what areas planning officials can regulate to a set of seven criteria: bulk and height of structures, yard size, lot area, setbacks, open space, parking and building coverage. The law applies to educational institutions, including child-care facilities, as well as religious operations.

Most recently in Andover, Merrimack College applied the provisions of the Dover Amendment to its proposal for new dorms on its campus on Elm Street at the North Andover line.

The discussion on Primrose Schools plans was continued to the Planning Board’s Aug. 11 meeting at 8 p.m.

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# Pomps Pond summer season in full swing

Hundreds of campers, kayakers and canoeists are flocking to the shores of Pomps Pond as the warmest part of the summer hits the region.

With temperatures expected to climb into the 90s through the weekend, the cooling waters of the pond are beckoning swimmers from near and far.

The pond, located off Abbot Street as part of Recreation Park complex, comprises 16 of the 62 acres in the park. Pomps Pond seasonal programs are coordinated by the town's Department of Community Services. It includes a spacious sunbathing area, recreational swimming, shaded picnic grounds, children's playground area, volleyball net, sailboat, canoe, and kayak rentals, bathrooms, showers, and a concession stand.

Red Cross certified swim lessons are offered to the community. Pre-registration is required for swimming lessons by calling the DCS office at 978-623-8274 or by going onto the organization's Web site at andoverdes.com.

But don't wait, as the season will be coming to an end in just a week or two. Aug. 16 is the last day Pomps Pond is open to the public.

Residents can get season passes or pay a discounted daily fee of \$5 per person, \$10 on weekends. Non-residents are allowed in for a fee of \$10 per person, \$20 on weekends. The charges are less for children under 13.

Sailboats can be rented for \$10 an hour, while canoes, kayaks and paddleboards can be rented for \$5 per hour.

Stand-Up-Paddleboards are going for \$10 per board for 30 minutes.

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# Town eyes completion, future uses of teen center

The Cormier Youth Center, still being built behind the Doherty Middle School, is now on track for an early October grand-opening, according to the chairman of the building committee overseeing construction of the \$5.7 million facility.

Chris Huntress gave an update to the Board of Selectmen this week that included an overview of the project, paid for using \$2 million in town funds with rest — nearly \$4 million — being raised and paid for by the Andover Youth Foundation. The “base bid,” making up

about 75 to 80 percent of the building, will be completed in the next couple of weeks, Huntress said.

That includes the gymnasium, the kitchen, offices, hallways, restrooms, a “wellness center” and all the utilities, such as heating and air-conditioning. The base bid also covers the exterior landscaping.

By the end of August or early September, a “multi-purpose room” with a stage and other accessories, should be finished by the contractor, Dagle Electric of Woburn. The multi-purpose room has been officially designated as the “Phillips Room” after the local,

private boarding school for its \$500,000 donation toward completion of the project.

That would leave about 3,000 square feet of unfinished space, Huntress said, which includes a workshop, a conference room and a TV/audio-visual studio.

He said the Youth Foundation needs to raise about \$200,000 to finish off that portion of the building, and has already received a \$50,000 donation for it. He said local companies have already expressed interest in helping finish off the remainder of the building. Dagle will not complete that portion of the project, he said.

## Future uses

Bill Fahey, executive director of Andover Youth Services, which will be the primary tenant of the building, said it will take at least a year for his organization to determine the best uses of the facility.

“It’s a brand-new facility,” he said. “We have to figure out how to use it. It’s going to take a couple of years.”

He said at the very least, the Youth Foundation will partner with the Punchard Center to use the facility for both senior citizens and youth in the community.

The property will not be rented out, he said. “That was not ever in the

plan,” he said. “If people want to partner with us, they can approach us and we’ll see if we can schedule them in.”

Highlights of the Cormier Center

The building will have a 1,000-square-foot workshop where kids can work on art projects such as sculptures or wooden kayaks.

A multipurpose room will have a moveable stage with built-in lighting and sound system as well as good acoustics for performances.

A full kitchen will be available for hot meals and will also serve as a culinary center where kids can hone their cooking skills.

The gym will be 8,900 square feet, making it the second largest gym in Andover after the field house at Andover High School, and will be large enough so that it can be split in half with a curtain to allow for two activities to occur simultaneously.

A cardio-fitness room can double as a dance studio or place for Zumba and other fitness classes.

Classroom space will be available for tutoring as well as computer courses.

A TV-music studio will allow people of all ages to make music videos or produce TV shows. Bands will also be able to record their own CDs.

## McSurprise at McDonald’s; Customer leaves behind loaded gun in bathroom

Lucky the Hamburglar wasn’t around the McDonald’s on North Main Street last week when a customer accidentally left behind his loaded Glock 27 pistol in the men’s bathroom,

According to police records, the licensed gun owner stopped by the bathroom after a visit to the fast-food restaurant last Tuesday afternoon, July 21, around 4:30 p.m.. But when he exited the restroom, the

unidentified man inadvertently forgot his gun as he left the restaurant.

Moments later, the restaurant’s manager entered the bathroom and discovered the unattended gun, according to police. He immediately alerted the Police Department.

“The man used the toilet and left (the gun) in there by mistake,” Andover Police Commander Charles Heseltine said. “When officers arrived, (the gun owner) was returning, as once he pulled out of the

lot he realized he left it and returned immediately.”

The gun owner returned to the McDonald’s to retrieve the gun as police were arriving at the restaurant. The Police Department and McDonald’s are within a mile of each other.

The man is fully licensed to carry a firearm, Heseltine said. Charges are not expected to be filed.

According to police records, however, detectives brought the gun back to the police station with them.

The Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure Committee oversees legislation

concerning consumer credit, consumer protection the issuance of licenses for the sale of alcoholic beverages and the registration of various trades and professions.

"There is a wide variety of consumer protection bills that directly impact businesses and Massachusetts residents that come before this committee every year," L'Italien said in the release. "My top priority on this committee will be to make it as easy and cost-effective as possible to do business in Massachusetts, without sacrificing public safety and protecting consumers."

The committee plays a key

role in overseeing local retail alcohol sales licenses and policy.

A specific number of licenses are made available in several categories for liquor stores and businesses such as bars, restaurants and clubs. Each city and town receives a quota based on the federal 2010 census in a process that is overseen by the state Alcohol Beverages Control Commission. To exceed those population-based quotas, a community must petition and receive approval from the Legislature, which relies on a recommendations from the Joint Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure.

L'Italien is a former four-term state representative who began serving in the Senate in January. She represents Andover, Lawrence, Tewksbury and Dracut.

# \$191K 'Green' grant to benefit schools, pumping station

Foreman Dwayne Scruton and Mechanical Engineer Andrea Suranyi, along with Andover Green Advisory Board member Anil Navkal, worked to make the grant a reality by creating a project titled "Andover: Raising the Bar in Energy Efficiency."

Thousands in Andover will soon profit from the hard work of a few dedicated residents.

Under the Massachusetts Department of Energy Resources Green Communities Program, Andover was recently awarded a \$191,901 grant to help make upgrades to school and town buildings.

The awards were announced earlier this month at a ceremony in Natick by Lt. Gov. Karyn Polito, Secretary of Energy and Environmental Affairs Matthew Beaton and Department of Energy Resources Commissioner Judith Johnson.

The group dubbed the Andover Energy Team, comprised of Environmental Compliance Coordinator Karen Martin, Manager of Energy and Utilities Janet Nicosia, Mechanical and Electrical

Their project outlined the team's goals of treating Andover High as the town's flagship school for energy improvements, while also raising energy standards of efficiency throughout town.

Andover High, West Middle and West Elementary schools as well as the town's water system will benefit from the grant.

The money will fund new interior LED lighting at the schools. Andover High will also see LED lighting installed as exterior lighting retrofits and building improvements, including air sealing and weather stripping, through the grant.

"Our work was an early breakthrough," Gannon said. It was a first and successful step that allowed a re-entering space vehicle to dissipate extreme heat.

An orbiting rocket, zipping at high speeds, slows as it enters the Earth's atmosphere from the friction of the spacecraft against the atmosphere, said Allan Needell, a curator at the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum.

The friction and slowing is akin to a car's brake system.

The Avco scientists needed a way to absorb and transform excess energy through charring and boiling spacecraft material and protecting the payload within it.

Kantrowitz's research with shock tubes and gases allowed scientists to simulate in a lab the extreme heat, thousands of degrees, collected by a missile re-entering the Earth's atmosphere traveling at almost 20,000 miles per hour.

Avco teams tested nose cone materials in those lab conditions.

Kantrowitz and Avco founder Victor Emanuel established the Avco Everett

Research Laboratory in Everett. Kantrowitz, the lab director, came up with the idea of using silica, or glass, for the nose cone.

It would melt, but not flow away because it was so viscous, Gannon said.

Gannon and other scientists

worked in Lawrence with Thomas Vasilos, who had come to Avco from the Corning Glass company. They tested and developed the silica material and placed it in the honeycomb design.

Finding the right material and design for the nose cone

was very significant to NASA's progress, Needell said.

The Lawrence Wood Mill team grew to several hundred employees working in six sections at the mill, Gannon said.

In the mid- to late-1950s, before he became president, then U.S. Sen. John F. Kennedy was big on getting federal money to encourage defense contractors to locate in his home state of Massachusetts, UMass Lowell history professor Robert Farrant said.

The Merrimack Valley area, including mill spaces in Lawrence and Lowell, had small defense contractors, he said.

There was a mighty motivation to advance American technology in those days.

In October 1957, the Soviet Union became the first country to launch a satellite.

U.S. military and political leaders were alarmed to think that the Soviet Union was moving ahead with technology to launch a nuclear missile, Gannon said. This put pressure on American scientists to keep pace or move ahead of the Soviets in the Cold War.

The U.S. took a major step forward when it retrieved a charred nose cone from the

ocean in 1958.

The Avco nose cone was the first to be recovered after re-entering the Earth's atmosphere. A sample from the nose cone is on display at the Smithsonian in Washington, D.C.

Everyone in the Gannon family, except for Dick, has visited the Smithsonian to see the nose cone, his wife said, adding they are all proud of the Avco team's contribution to science and space exploration.

Gannon worked for Avco more than 40 years, retiring in 1986. The company was later acquired by Textron. Many of his Avco team members who worked in Lawrence in those years have passed away.

Both Gannon and his wife think many people might be curious to know about Lawrence's contribution, early on, to the space program.

They say the city was home to important research and has a place in the history of space exploration.

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# Elm Street assisted-living project gets green light

## 103-unit project faced neighborhood opposition

A 103-unit senior housing project proposed for the hill at 139-143 Elm St. won the unanimous approval of the Planning Board last week during its first and only round of deliberations.

The 88,126-square-foot, assisted-living residence proposed by Capitol Seniors Housing of Washington, D.C. has been a topic in nearly a dozen Planning Board meetings dating back to Nov. 14,

during which time several residents voiced their concern and opposition to it. Some have expressed fear of a worsening traffic situation in the area, the loss of the neighborhood feel and the need for the project in Andover.

More than 300 residents opposed to the project signed a petition in hopes of swaying the minds of decision makers.

While some planning officials agreed the size and day-to-day operation of the facility may have negative impact for its neighbors, they were unable to find “unreasonably detrimental” conditions, mandatory for a “no” vote.

“I can’t find anything that I find detrimental,” Planning Board Vice Chairman Vincent Chiozzi said. “I think

we’ve been very thorough.”

Since early on in the discussion, several alterations have been made to the original plans, which were meant to alleviate concerns regarding the building’s look and size in a residential neighborhood; new building designs were drawn, new features added to create a “New England feel” and new landscaping ideas were considered.

It’s because of the developer’s flexibility that Chairman Zach Bergeron said he now felt comfortable with the final plans.

“Every time a problem came up, they jumped and said, ‘What can we do better?’” he said. “I think this is an appropriate product.”

Fifty-three conditions were agreed upon by officials, including most notably the

installation of a “Speed Alert Sign” to slow traffic, a restriction on where overflow parking would be staged to keep cars off Elm Street, handicapped sidewalks during all construction phases and a long-term plan with trees planted at the location.

Senior Planner Lisa Schwarz said that the facility will provide “another option for the people who live in Andover, or for their parents, aunts or uncles who they may want to bring here to be closer to.”

# Town manager selection process advances to forum

So far, so good in the town manager selection process. Now, it’s on to a public forum.

Most selectmen said last Friday they are confident about moving ahead with the two finalists: Andrew Flanagan, 29, Arlington’s deputy town manager, and Kendra Amaral, 39, Wilmington’s assistant town manager and human resources director.

The board moved the selection process to the next step — a public forum with a question and answer portion, on Wednesday, July 29, at 7 p.m. in the Memorial Hall Library.

The forum will be moderated by Selectmen Chairwoman Mary O’Donoghue. Each finalist will have 20 minutes for an opening statement. Next, residents will ask the prospective town managers questions, to be read by the moderator.

Selectmen advanced the selection process to the public forum during a special 7:30 a.m. meeting in Town Hall last Friday.

Several selectmen said they look forward to seeing how Amaral and Flanagan perform in the forum setting.

Selectman Paul Salafia said the board will see the candidates under a little pressure, interacting with the public, and that’s a good thing since public interaction is part of a town manager’s job.

Earlier this month, selectmen met individually with the finalists in one-on-one meetings.

Based on those meetings, board members said they agreed with the town screening committee’s characterization of the finalists as young “rising stars” in town management.

Selectman Alexander Vispoli said finalist Flanagan was a better fit for Andover, due, in part, to his financial management experience.

Selectman Robert Landry said one of the candidates “really blew me away” during his one-on-one meetings. He did not indicate which of the candidates was extremely impressive.

Selectman Dan Kowalski said he would like to see the pool of applicants

broadened to include someone with more experience than the two finalists.

Selectmen are scheduled to meet Thursday, July 30, at 6 p.m. at Town Hall, to review the finalists’ showing at the public forum.

Selectmen expect to announce their choice for the new town manager no later than Aug. 31.

In an earlier meet-and-greet with selectmen, Flanagan told the board that since taking his first job as assistant town manager in

Winthrop, his hometown, in 2006, his work experience has given him the tools and the skills needed to run a big town like Andover.

Amaral, at the meet and greet, called herself a “tech wonk” and a “data wonk” who “uses technology in decision-making.”

Her experience as a “change agent” has led her to take jobs that require a lot of work and a lot of problem-solving — something she said she thrives on.

### Armenian students donate flag, books to AHS

Thanks to the actions of some Andover High School students of Armenian descent, an ethnic flag is now being flown in the school's library and new books chronicling the history and culture of the Armenians are now found on the shelves.

Noticing there was no Armenian tricolor represented in the library's League of Nations, the students moved forward, securing a flag and presenting it to the library at the end of the school year.

In addition, books donated by author Lucine Kasbarian titled "Armenia: A Rugged Land, an Enduring People" were also given to the library.

The gesture coincided with this year's commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the Armenian genocide of 1915, in which 1.5 million martyrs lost their lives.

John Berube, a library media specialist at the school, said there used to be an Armenian flag displayed, but it was among some nations' flags that have "somehow disappeared" over time. He commended the students for bringing the missing Armenian flag to the library's attention.

"Flags from every other country were displayed in our library and we wanted to be included, especially this year with the anniversary,"

rising senior Ani Minasian said in a release. "It could have been an oversight, but not anymore."

Joining Minasian for the presentation were her brother Richard Minasian, Michael Mahlebjan, Anna Shahtanian and Christopher Berberian.

"Our mission is not only to educate students on the genocide, but to get them involved in moments like these," said Dro Kanayan of North Andover, chairman of the Armenian Genocide Education Committee of Merrimack Valley, which has been delivering genocide education and awareness programs to area schools over the past seven years.

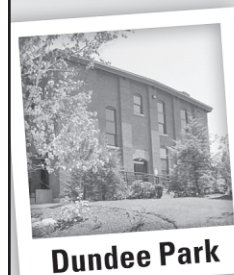

## Two AHS seniors participate in collegiate program

# College student pursues passion for outdoors on 88-day expedition

Two rising Andover High School seniors will have a good answer when asked what they did this summer.

Angela Wang and James Zhou were selected by the Northeastern University's College of Engineering to participate in its highly selective Young Scholars Program.

This six-week summer session allows students to conduct research with faculty from the university's College of Engineering in the Chemical Engineering and Mechanical Engineering departments. Founded in 1989, this program seeks to increase the number of students who pursue science, technology, engineering and math majors, the so-called STEM subjects, at the collegiate level.

Wang, who is interested in a career in engineering, will

be working with Northeastern Assistant Professor Eno Ebong to delve into the world of blood cell communication and "sugar coating."

Atherosclerosis, a blood vessel disease defined by arterial hardening due to tissue remodeling and plaque buildup, occurs at artery branches where blood flow is unstable. The Ebong Group is conducting basic research to study the impact of blood flow-derived forces on the integrity of blood vessel endothelial cells, which make up the protective skin of the inner blood vessel wall and are the first line of defense against atherosclerosis. Since atherosclerosis is a precursor to heart attack, stroke,

aneurysm, peripheral vascular disease and retinal vascular disease, the research is said to be critical for solving serious and costly societal health problems.

When not conducting research, Wang enjoys playing piano for her church congregation every Sunday, as well as running track and performing Chinese dances.

Zhang will be working with Associate Professor Yung Joon Jung in the Department of Mechanical Engineering to build nanotube fiber electrical fusion systems.

His research will focus on a novel carbon nanostructure engineering process called carbon nanotube

fusion. The method controls input voltages across the network to create cross links between CNTs, transforming them into larger diameter, single-walled CNTs, multi-walled CNTs, or multi-layered graphene nanoribbons with tremendous property improvement. The overall research objective of the project is to create high-performing fibers for applications in aerospace, high-power density energy storage, lightweight cabling and wiring, structural health monitoring and more.

Zhang is the president of Andover High's Chess Club and has participated in U.S. Chess Federation-rated tournaments since the fifth grade. He also enjoys playing soccer and basketball. He hopes to eventually earn his doctorate in physics and work as a lab researcher when he's older.

Andover's Edward Martin literally took learning to new heights this past spring.

Martin spent 88 days in the Rocky Mountains on a wilderness expedition with The National Outdoor Leadership School.

The 18-year-old who is studying environmental geosciences at Colorado Mesa University in Grand Junction, Colo., was one of 12 students, accompanied by 11 instructors, who set out on the course that began in the Wind River Range in Lander, Wyo.

Traveling from west to east, the group hiked 35 miles and gained more than 12,000 feet of elevation, crossing the continental divide and swimming in lakes along the way.

Next, they transitioned to water, canoeing on the Green River's Desolation Canyon and the San Juan River. Students learned leadership skills as well as basic and advanced technical skills, including how to line rapids and conduct swift water rescues.

Then, the climb. Starting in Lankin Dome, the students gained basic climbing skills before completing a multi-pitch climb. They traveled to Sinks Canyon for the second where they worked together

on climbing techniques. The expedition wrapped up in the canyon in southeastern Utah, where they explored the natural and human history while completing technical descents.

After strengthening their teamwork skills, students were encouraged to work independently and given the chance to reflect in a deeply spiritual place.

Martin has returned to New England for the summer, and is working as a whitewater rafting guide for Three Rivers Whitewater in West Forks, Maine.

A 2014 graduate of The Oliverian School, a boarding school in Pike, N.H., he is the son of Blake and Abby Martin. He credits his father, a geologist who was also a raft guide during the summer while in college, for fueling his love for adventure and the outdoors.

"My father has always been an avid outdoorsman and has always inspired me to continue to pursue a lifetime full of adventure and reverence for the beauty of the natural world around us," Martin said in an email. "I am following his footsteps very closely, while also diversifying the means by which I accomplish these steps."

## AHS shares savings with remote village in India

Andover High School rising sophomore Neeharika Munjal realizes she's pretty blessed. Her hope is to allow others to benefit from her good fortune as well.

"When I was younger, my parents taught me to share and give back," the 15-year-old said. "I have always felt privileged and wanted to help children enjoy the same pleasures that I have."

While sitting at lunch with her mother and her friend last month, the trio began talking about living conditions in India. The Ekal Vidyalaya Foundation, a nonprofit organization involved in education and development in the

"It felt really good, because I've wanted to donate my money to them for a long time," she said. "My money will help them have a good education, and will give kids the opportunity to be inspired."

Since its formation, the Ekal Vidyalaya Foundation

has assisted 52,000 villages in India, and reached 1.5 million children and nearly 30 million adults.

Munjal's parents, Preeti and Manoj, said they were proud to be able to help their daughter reach her goal of a \$5,000 donation.

"She made my husband and I cry when she told us," said her mother. "We have always told her that she should share her privileges, and that she has many things that many children are deprived of. She said she never had to spend her money because we would buy her what she needed, and that she wanted to give it to others."

"We were very pleased, happy and knew we did something right."

winner-take-all championship game at the gorgeous Benevento Memorial Fields in North Reading.

In the rematch with Salem, Stephen Ingram sent the locals home early. Or at least early for this crazy tourney. After a 75-minute rain delay, the 5-foot-6 slugger settled matters with a 230-foot, 3-run homer to break a scoreless tie in the top of the sixth. The Nats held on for the dramatic 3-0 win, which again lasted until 10:15 a.m.

Maybe it was fortuitous that the Cinderella Nats ended this one before midnight.

## Ingram's titanic clout

"I haven't been hitting well," said Ingram, who is entering the 7th grade at West Middle School. "I was kind of in a slump. The first pitch was my dream pitch: a little high and outside and at good speed. As soon as I made contact I knew it was gone."

Gone, baby, gone. It nearly hit the light tower in left centerfield a la Roy Hobbs.

Andover won the classic pitchers duel with Ingram's muscle and Sean Sullivan's mound mastery (5.1 dominant innings, an impressive 12 Ks, 2 walks, 3 hits, all singles) and a secret formula: discipline at the plate.

The patient Nationals worked the count throughout so, in the sixth, Lee Pacheco (5-plus innings, 9 Ks, 2 walks, 5 hits, all singles) had to be removed for reaching the 85-pitch Little League limit.

That's 6-foot, 150-pound Lee Pacheco, an intimidating presence on the hill, to say the least. One cell phone app clocked him at 76 mph and consistently over 70 mph.

On a Little League diamond (46 feet vs. 60-6 for MLB), that's like facing Clayton Kershaw.

He'd be Salem's version of Toby Guzewski, whose height and blazing fastball sparked the great 1988 Andover National Little League team to the Little League World Series in Williamsport, Pa.

Could this club duplicate that Herculean feat? There is a long ways to go as they still have the States and then the Eastern Regionals to reach the 16-team (8 from the U.S. and 8 from abroad) LLWS.

## Not first time

"That took a little pressure off," admitted Ingram, when asked about facing the Salem relief pitcher. "(Pacheco) is probably the hardest thrower I've seen."

His teammates are always confident when Ingram is at the dish. He may have been the most feared slugger in the state last year when an Andover team with numerous players on this squad made the Little League 11-year-old tourney state finals.

In addition to his considerable talents, Sullivan has a bit of Nostradamus in him.

He said, "I told him before his at-bat (he'd hit it out). He always comes through in the clutch."

The game was delayed nearly an hour and a half (8:13 to 9:37 p.m.) when heavy rains hit in the bottom of the fifth. Six North Reading Little League officials worked feverishly on the infield and after much discussion the game was resumed.

So the young Nationals must have been getting bleeding ulcers in the dugout?

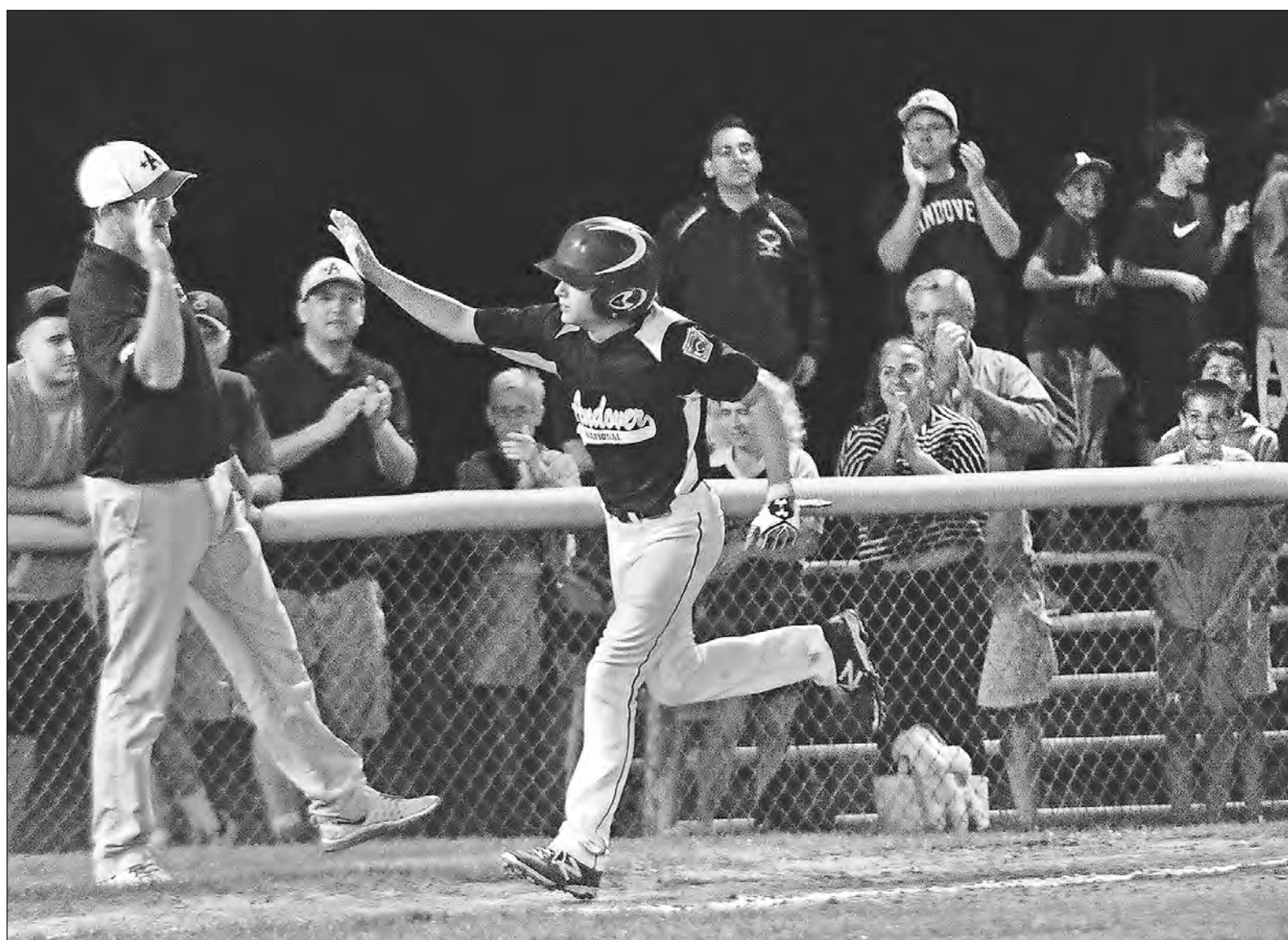
Not even close.

"We were messing around," explained the freckle-faced southpaw Sullivan, who will be an 8th grader at Doherty Middle School.

"No. No," insisted the 5-3, 130-pound Sullivan, who dominated with a fastball that at one point hit 70 mph, as well as a nasty change-up and curveball.

"This is the loosest team I've ever seen," said head coach Scott Schirmer. "It's like the 2004 Red Sox."

Both are champions but the Andoverites aren't "idiots." Almost all are

honor roll students and their drink of choice is Gatorade.

## Ace vs. ace

Aidan Ritter led off the game with a walk against the towering Pacheco, who then retired 10 straight batters, eight via the strikeout. Andrew Kenefick ended the no-hit bid with a bloop single to center with one down in the fourth.

Sullivan was also in vintage form. He gave up a leadoff walk, too, and Tommy Beauregard advanced to third on a ground out and a wild pitch. But Sullivan escaped the bottom of the first jam with a strikeout swinging.

He retired eight straight batters after that with six strikeouts.

An infield error and Salem's first hit, a William

Foglietta single, put runners on first and second with one out in the fourth.

But Andover threw out a hesitating runner at third. Jack Gilligan singled and soon there were runners on second and third. But Sullivan got out of the jam with yet another strikeout.

Salem turned a double-play to wipe out a mini-threat by the Nationals in

the fifth.

Salem had runners on first and second in the bottom of the fifth when the skies opened. After the delay, Bobby Jellison singled to load the bases.

Sullivan got Pacheco to chase a high fastball and the big guy slammed his bat in frustration over the inning-ending whiff.

Kenefick laced a hard single off Ryan LeClare to set the stage for Ingram.

## Town leaders should tread carefully on opiate fight

Police Chief Patrick Keefe's plan to combat opiate addiction in Andover, unveiled during a Tuesday morning meeting with the Board of Selectmen this week, relies on the hiring of two, new employees who would work for the police department. One of them would be an "addiction clinician" who would focus on assisting people in the community who need treatment, according to the draft of a job description provided by Keefe to the public.

"The position would reach out to addicts and their families to support them in developing a plan to ensure their survival, to facilitate the long-term process of recovery, and to avail addicts and their loved ones to services," it said.

The other position would be a "substance abuse program coordinator," who would "work with town departments to identify needs and concerns regarding substance abuse and disorders."

The job description goes on to say the coordinator would "assist addicts, families and friends with support and resources to assist them through recovery...creating a non-judgmental environment."

Aside from the fact that the job descriptions sound very similar, it is not known what the salaries of these two positions would be. Based on the town's approval of a new position in Andover Youth Services for an outreach worker two years ago who was supposed to help combat the town's drug problem, it is likely that each position would command a salary of \$60,000 or more.

Selectmen seem inclined to support the two, new positions, voting 3-0 in favor of Keefe's plan, with a recommendation that he work with the human resources department on more specific job descriptions and the financial services department on a plan to pay for it.

Selectmen Chairwoman Mary O'Donoghue said Tuesday that no additional money would be spent on the two positions but that cuts would have to be made elsewhere to pay for the two positions.

"We've been talking about this for weeks now," she said. "We can do nothing, or do this."

She added, "hopefully this won't be in perpetuity. But we need more resources. That's what I'm hearing, from the professionals and the people affected by this epidemic."

The chief's plan is partly based on a plan by Gloucester Police Chief Leonard Campanello, who has created the so-called "Angel Program," which consists of volunteers who accompany addicts seeking help to the hospital or a detox center. The addicts are treated as patients rather than as criminals. Instead of being arrested, they get treatment.

"It hasn't costed a dime," Campanello said Tuesday, noting that as of Tuesday afternoon at 5 p.m., 77 people had gone through the program since it started earlier this year.

Andover selectmen, over the last couple of years, have been wary of hiring any new employees because of the impact every new job has on the budget as well as long-term liabilities such as retiree health insurance and pensions.

Make no mistake - the problem is severe: Seven people have died in Andover so far this year.

The point is that selectmen shouldn't make a knee-jerk decision based on information collected by the police chief over the last few weeks. Gloucester has been dealing with its heroin problem for 25 years. The city has a substantial infrastructure of non-profit and medical organizations and institutions that have stepped up to help the program succeed.

Spending \$120,000 or more to hire two employees for the police department may be a mistake. There are options and alternatives. In fact, Andover Youth Services hired a social worker earlier this year using funds approved by Town Meeting in 2014. When the funding was approved by Town Meeting, it was done with the understanding that the new person would help reach out to the town's youth to help combat the drug problem. According to AYS Executive Director Bill Fahey, that's not how that person is being used.

Maybe selectmen should insist Fahey use that new social worker specifically to combat the drug problem.

Or maybe the town could enlist volunteer "angels" like Gloucester does.

There are options and alternatives - and more resources - that can be tapped. At the Tuesday morning meeting, some of those resources appeared, including the Memorial Hall Library director, the new superintendent of schools and the new high school principal. Other town officials were also in attendance. Health Director Tom Carbone was at a recent meeting to discuss the problem.

The town hasn't even started talking to residents in town or families immediately affected by the problem.

But at least, finally, town leaders are taking the problem seriously.

### THIS WEEK'S QUESTION

The Cormier Youth Center is almost done. After all these years - more than a decade of stops and starts - the center should have its grand opening in October. Andover Youth Services (AYS) Executive Director Bill Fahey said it will take a year or more to determine exactly how the building should be used. How do you think it should be used?

Let everyone use it. It will have a huge gym, \$2 million in taxpayers' dollars helped build it, and it should be available to any viable group that wants to sign up to use it.

Let seniors and teens only use it. Because the town volunteered money from the Wood Estate, which is primarily a fund for elderly services, seniors at the Punchard Center should share it with teenagers involved in AYS programs.

Only teens from AYS should use it. They have waited so long for the teen center to be built, that only they should be allowed to use it.

### LAST WEEK'S QUESTION

Last week, the public, other town committee members and the press were denied access to a Planning Board site walk of the St. Francis Seminary on River Road, which is slated for demolition as part of a proposed over-65 housing community on the property. Should the tour have been open to everyone?

**YES.** Questions surround the need to demolish the building. Even if the public was not legally entitled to attend, opening the site walk would have allowed interested individuals to gain a better understanding of the condition of the property. 64 percent

**NO.** The developer is not obligated to allow public access to private property. And the state Open Meeting Law gives the Planning Board authority to attend site walks for informational purposes only as agents of the community. 36 percent

## Bulger confidant shares fictionalized look at Boston's former crime boss

"The first book, I didn't want to write because I didn't want to talk about what I had done," Kevin Weeks said.

What the South Boston native "had done" was became one of Boston's most feared mobsters as James "Whitey" Bulger's right-hand man for more than 20 years.

That first book, "Brutal: The Untold Story of My Life Inside Whitey Bulger's Irish Mob," was released in 2006, five years before Bulger's capture.

Now, he has co-written a

second book with author Phyllis Karas, titled "Hunted Down: The Pursuit and Capture of Whitey Bulger." The duo traveled to town last week for a book-signing and a talk that drew a rapt crowd to Andover Bookstore.

"Brutal" is 100 percent truthful, Karas said, where "Hunted Down" is more of a fictional story.

It tells the story of the FBI's pursuit of Jim Bugler, as Weeks refers to him, throughout his 16 years on the run. It delves into how and why he was involved, what he believes happened while Bulger was on the run, why Bulger traveled to



where he did and why he was pursued.

"It takes more of a look inside his personality and how he would react to different situations," Weeks said. "It gives some insight to Bulger's psyche."

For his first two years on the run, Weeks had contact with Bulger and his girlfriend, Cathy Greig. So although Weeks could not be completely certain about Bulger's precise movements, he had a good sense of what likely happened.

"He had good inside information," Karas added.

Originally, the story focused on where Bulger was hiding. But the authorities found Bulger 24 hours after the book was released. Karas said the publishers asked them to go back and rework the story to incorporate his arrest and trial.

"Readers should read this story if they like suspense," Weeks said. "It's a page turner."

Weeks first met Bulger when he was 18, working as a bouncer at a club in Southie called Triple O's Lounge.

He said their relationship

began with a friendly exchange of hellos, but "little by little, he took interest in me." Weeks said he was known for getting into fights and Bulger liked the way he handled himself.

He started working for Bulger part-time, getting involved in the smaller crimes, but eventually made his way up to the more serious ones.

In 1999, Weeks was arrested and pleaded guilty to 29 counts, including five murders. He was offered a reduced sentence if he agreed to cooperate with authorities by showing them where the bodies of the victims were buried.

Another deal he was not pleased to make was writing a book detailing his life of crime with Bulger. But Weeks said he was being sued by the victims' families and did not have any assets, so the profits from the book would be given to them.

Karas, who had written a few memoirs before, including one on another of Bulger's men, Edward Mackenzie, was asked to team with Weeks. Karas said the first book was hard for Weeks. But their working relationship has improved.

"We work well at this point," she said. "It was far more fun this time."

Weeks has been out of jail

for 10 years now and said he is a changed man.

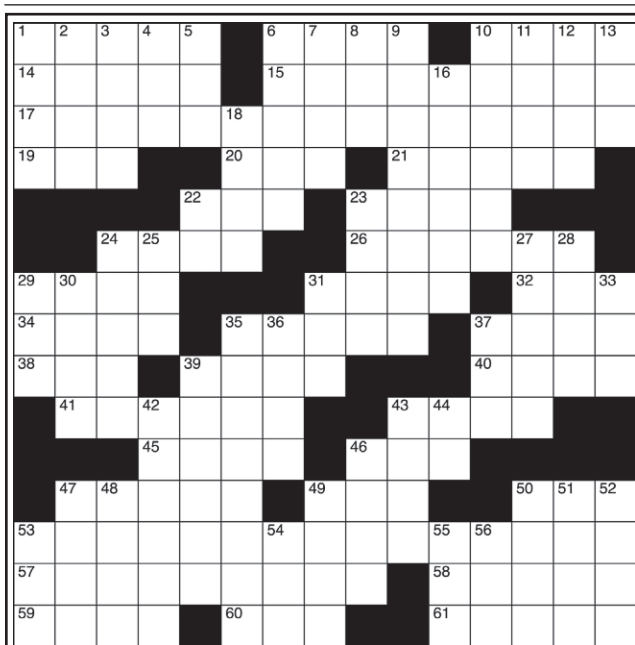
"I did that years ago," he said.

Remarrying his current wife and spending time with his sons and family has made him realize what is important in life, he said.

Weeks also seems to have found a new passion for writing stories. He has another book about a jewelry thief three-quarters of the way done and it has already been picked up by a publisher.

He describes writing stories as something new and fun.

"I like to read," he said. "In books, you can do anything you want. It's enjoyable."

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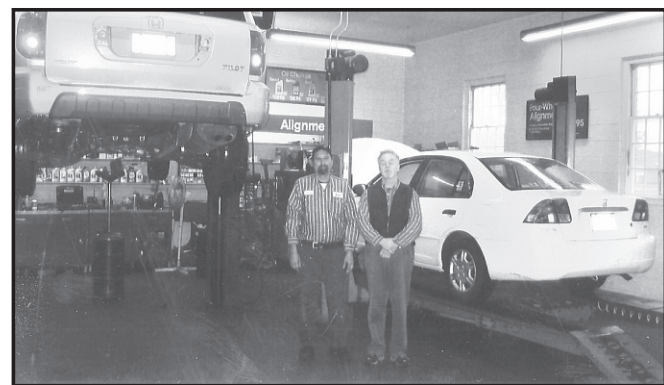

## 4K FOR CANCER

Recent college graduate pedaling 70 days in honor of mom, other survivors

It isn't so much Kellie Walsh's sweet tooth that won her the attention of her dentist, but rather the 22-year-old's oversized, generous heart.

Dr. Francis McCarthy and the staffers, hygienists and clients in his Central Street office recently donated \$4,000 to Walsh's cross-country bike ride through 4K for Cancer.

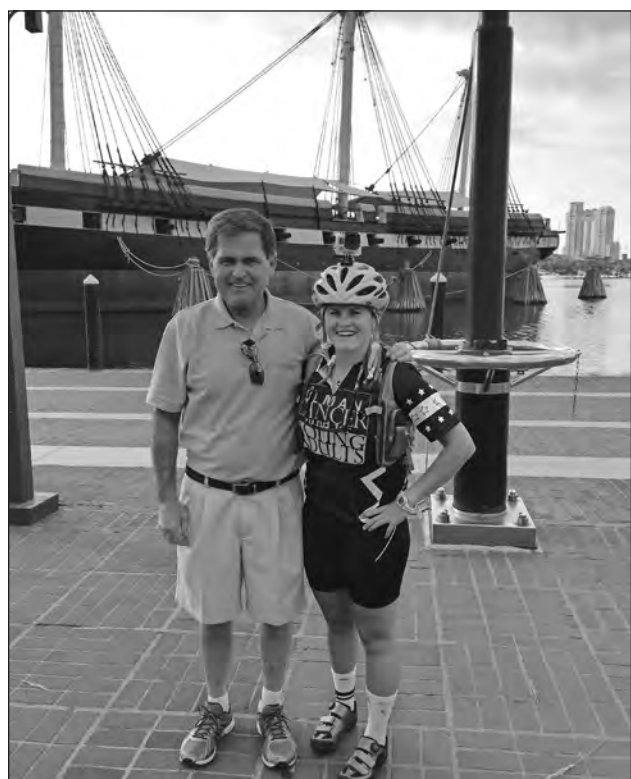
Just one week after her graduation from Colby College in Maine, Walsh set off on the 4,000-mile, 70-day bicycling adventure June 1 from Baltimore, Md., and is due to reach Portland, Ore., next Saturday, Aug. 8.

She's part of a 29-member team of primarily college-age students pedaling to raise money while offering hope, inspiration and support to cancer patients in communities all along the way.

"While biking across the country is not easy, neither is cancer. ... 4K is my way of giving back to the cancer community," Walsh said.

It was Walsh's mother, Jean, who battled breast cancer a decade ago that inspired her to get involved. While her mother is now a strong survivor of breast cancer, Walsh acknowledged her continued good health is well worth riding for.

"I was just 11 when my mom was diagnosed with breast cancer and I know what it's like for families ... cancer affects so many families and I just wanted to do something for cancer

research," she said from her cellphone while on a water break near Jackson, Wyo., on July 16.

Walsh and her bike-mates have been riding a minimum of 75 miles a day to stay on target of their 4,000-mile course. They are accompanied by two vans filled with sleeping bags and other necessary gear and typically spend their evenings sleeping in church basements. Everyone is riding the same Trek bike as a way to keep repairs manageable.

"It's a great way to see the country and meet

people," said Walsh, the only cyclist on the ride from Massachusetts.

While participants were required to raise a minimum of \$4,500 apiece, Walsh collected nearly three times that amount, donating \$12,000 to the cause. She was helped in part by the donation from the team associated with Dr. McCarthy, who is a friend of her family, who has lived on Orchard Street.

4K for Cancer is a program of Ulman Cancer Fund for Young Adults, a nonprofit organization

that aims to change lives by creating a community of support for young adults and their loved ones as they fight cancer and embrace survivorship. It has been leading groups of college students on bike rides since 2001. This year, 170 participants are traveling across America with the hope of raising more than \$1 million for the cause.

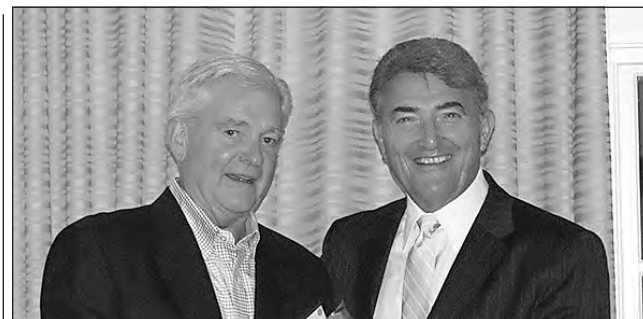
Walsh, who was a field hockey standout at Phillips Academy in Andover before going on to Colby, said the 4K for Cancer has offered her an opportunity to be a part of something bigger than herself before her adult working life begins. She'll be putting her degree in economics and environmental science to use this fall when she starts her job at Fidelity in Portland, Maine.

Except for the tornadoes in Iowa and coping with two leg stress fractures that required cortisone shots to relieve the pain, she said she'll ride to the end no matter what.

Walsh's father, James, saw her off on the ride in Maryland and she's also received support from her brother Jimmy, 21. But it will be her mother, who is cancer free these days and feeling terrific, who will be waiting for her at the end of the journey on Aug. 8.

It promises to be a magical mother-daughter reunion.

**100 Years Ago

It is understood that this new street, which is ultimately to extend eastward and swing around Rabbit's Rock, near the Memorial Missionary Boulder, is to have the appropriate name of Judson Road.

Tomorrow afternoon, the annual picnic of the local Good Templars will be held at Haggetts pond. The barges will leave the square at 1:15. There are still a few more tickets available for those wishing to attend. A fine list of sports has been arranged for both boys and girls.

**75 Years Ago  
July 25, 1940**

J. Everett Collins at the insistence of many friends stepped into the race of Republican nomination for representative from the Fourth Essex District on Monday, with the necessary signatures being promptly secured. The selectman is the

The Biggest Little Jewelry Store in the state became bigger this week. John H. Greco, who started six years ago in the little store of John Ferguson's, which has been absorbed by Hill Hardware, has enlarged his present quarters next to the new store. A substantial addition has been made at the rear of the store.

Frank McBride Jr. certainly enjoyed his lunch Tuesday noon, even though there was some doubt whether he should have eaten it or framed it. It was as large and as beautiful a bass as has ever been caught in Poms Pond, and it weighed — honest, he has witnesses — 5 pounds, 6 ounces.

A front-page photo appears with the caption, "Wreathed in Ceremonial Smiles are Philip K. Allen, chairman of the Board of Selectmen, and Mike Holovak, coach of the Boston Patriots pro football team in training at Phillips Academy." Holovak visited the board Monday to receive the first key to Andover ever given a visiting dignitary. The wooden key was handcrafted by none other than Town Manager Richard Bowen.

After a gloomy report from Town Manager Richard Bowen on the limited prospects for any improvement in the water level at Poms Pond, the board acted promptly to schedule an Aug. 16 Town Meeting

for immediate approval of the long-planned Fish Brook project.

**25 Years Ago  
July 26, 1990**

The program itself starts the week of Aug. 6.

The 50 layoff notices were given out earlier this month at the company's Missiles Systems Division at 350 Lowell St. The cuts affected salaried positions in production control and product assurance, according to Mr. Powers.

### Back from surgery, former Andover slugger looks to take game to another level

It's been a long road back from Tommy John surgery, but Andover's Alex Brickman is officially back and bigger than ever.

Brickman, who will turn 18 next month, has bulked up to 6-4, 250 pounds and is coming off a successful spring season with Worcester Academy and a summer traveling the country with his club team. Now the former Andover High slugger is starting to garner some serious Division 1 attention, having already received an offer from Division 1 Siena College in New York, along with overtures from schools like UConn, Pitt, Penn State, URI and Stony Brook.

Prior to this year, Brickman was a three-year varsity player at Andover High before he transferred to Worcester

Academy and reclassified as a junior.

While at Andover, Brickman was perhaps the area's best hitter. He earned All-Star honors from The Townsman's sister paper, The Eagle-Tribune, as a junior, when he batted .428 with 22 RBIs and 15 runs for the Division 1 North champs. That despite blowing out his arm at a pitching showcase at St. John's University in New York prior to the season, which limited him to DH duty that spring.

Though his numbers may not have suffered, Brickman said it's been a long road back, and even now he doesn't expect his arm will ever be quite the same.

"It was definitely a process, one day you're good, the next day you're in some pain," said Brickman, who played basketball for Andover, but doesn't play for the high-powered Hilltoppers. "It's still like that. Some days are better than others, but overall my arm is better."

Brickman eventually made a full recovery, and while he does still pitch, he said he's shifted his focus primarily to hitting, and the work is paying off.

This spring, he hit .360 with six home runs to help lead the Hilltoppers to a 25-6 record and the New England Prep Blackburn Tournament championship.

Notably, Brickman had two home runs in the team's 7-3 win over Cushing Academy in Ashburnham in the semifinal, including a sixth-inning grand slam to break a 3-3 tie. Then he drove in two runs in the 11-4 win over Phillips Andover in the championship game.

Once the prep season was over, Brickman quickly transitioned to summer ball, playing as part of the Evoshield Canes Mid-Atlantic 17U team. Based out of New Jersey, the Canes spent the summer traveling all over the country, playing at college stadiums, often in front of high-level scouts and coaches.

"It's been good to get used to traveling, getting off a plane and playing, it'll be good for college ball," Brickman said. "In high-pressure situations, too, you're playing in front of

### AHS grad-turned-pro wrestler bringing his showmanship to region's ring

There are days that Andover's Mark Shurman limps into his office at General Electric battered and bruised, wounds clashing with his clean shirt and tie like a character from the film "Fight Club."

When he travels on business, he's on his computer during the flight searching for the best gym to spend his off time running through his required daily training regimen. That's in addition to tanning and other requirements, like finding a stationery store to print up his newest 8-by-10 inch promo shots, which he must pay for.

But that's just fine with the former Andover High class vice president. Anything to chase his dream — in fact, his obsession.

When you have been beaten up by John Cena on national television, the time and the sacrifices are all worth it.

Shurman is pursuing his lifelong passion for professional wrestling, as the fighter known as "The Sure Thing," and 2014 Chaotic Wrestling Heavyweight Champion.

He will be taking the stage close to home on Sunday, when he joins World Wrestling Entertainment legends Rey Mysterio, Jerry "The King" Lawler and Mick Foley for "Wrestling Under the Stars" at LeLacheur Park, home of the Lowell Spinners.

"I am just thrilled to be a part of this," Shurman said. "I'm excited to share the stage with big names and wrestle at such a big venue like a baseball field. I get a huge rush before every show, and to have one so close to home with my fans there will be amazing."

It is part of a dual existence for the 30-year-old Shurman, who must juggle time as the "Sure Thing" with his daily life as an account manager for GE.

"They started calling me limpy around the office after a back injury," he said with a laugh. "I'm pretty safe, but things happen. I've had concussions and injured my knees and have a big scar down my back. It's tough having a full-time job and doing this, but I am willing to sacrifice anything to touch my dream."

Shurman cannot remember a time that wrestling was not his obsession.

"I was a fanatic growing up," he said. "Everyone in Andover knew how much I loved wrestling. In elementary school, I had all the action figures and in middle school, I had all the shirts."

"I played JV sports at Andover High, but I was more the class clown, which is a big part of my wrestling persona. I was the news anchor for the school's news program and I wanted to entertain."

After graduating from Andover High in 2003, Shurman hoped to become a wrestler. But his parents had other plans.

"They said, 'NO WAY,'" he said. "They told me I had to get my college degree first. They were hoping I would change my mind when I got older."

But after graduating from Salem State with a degree in business management in 2008, Shurman enrolled at the New England Pro Wrestling Academy, located conveniently in North Andover.

"They use a lot of tough love there," he said. "It is a fight. I have been punched in the face 'by accident,' but really on purpose. They try to make you quit. But once you stick it out, they start to support you."

Far from a natural athlete, the 6-foot-2, 230-pound Shurman relies on his strength — and his charisma.

"The biggest thing in wrestling is getting people to care about your character," he said. "I'm not out there doing flips. But neither were Hulk Hogan and 'Stone Cold' Steve Austin. It's about showmanship."

"I wrestle for reaction. I am looking for cheers or boos. I started as a bad guy. I used to insult the audience. But they loved it and started to cheer for me. So I've been a good guy ever since."

Shurman has his hands full attempting to make a name for himself as a wrestler, while also living a normal life. Roughly three weeks ends a month, he is performing in local shows across New England, from Lowell and Woburn to Maine and

Connecticut.

"I love it, but it is tough," he said. "I have to convince my boss at GE to let me out early some Fridays so I can rush to Fall River or Storrs, Conn. for a show. I am traveling to Florida and Michigan for work. People don't know a lot of the sacrifices. And I'm 30 now, so I have to work a lot harder to protect my body. And I know my window to make it is closing."

tastes of the big time. That includes when he played the character of a security guard that fought superstar John Cena, who originally hails from West Newbury, during a "WWE Raw" show in Connecticut.

Piper. I had Razor Ramon in my corner and tag-teamed with Sgt. Slaughter. It keeps me chasing that dream, that maybe I will catch the eye of someone."

He is again excited to take the ring with some of his heroes at LeLacheur.

"I grew up watching guys like Rey Mysterio and Mick Foley, so to wrestle alongside them and share a locker room with them is so exciting."

"Plus, I am so close to home that hopefully a lot of my fans — the 'Shurmaniacs' — will be there."

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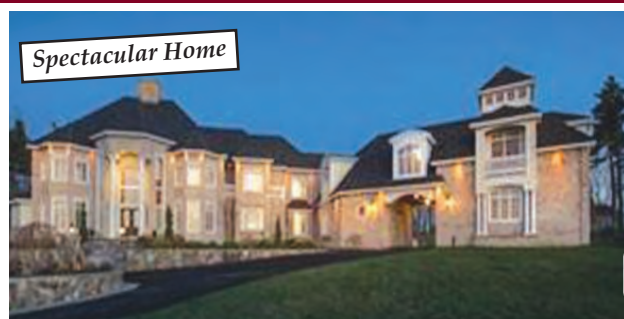
