New town manager selected

Flanagan chosen for 'transparency, fiscal responsibility, accountability'

Selectmen said they chose Andrew Flanagan, 29, to be the next town manager because they are confident the young man will usher in new ideas and work well with others.

It now falls to the board to negotiate a five-year contract — a tenure required by the town charter — with him. The board expects to meet in executive session this week with town lawyer Tom Urbelis to prepare an offer for Flanagan.

The offer will go out to him and he will then meet with selectmen to hammer out a deal. "I feel very confident that we can reach agreement fairly quickly with Andrew Flanagan," board Chairwoman Mary O'Donoghue said on Monday.

Flanagan, now Arlington's deputy town manager, could be aboard in Andover as soon as Oct. 1, the chairwoman said earlier.

Flanagan said in an interview shortly after his selection that he felt honored to be chosen and appreciative for the opportunity. He looks forward to working on behalf of the town, bringing his skills to bear in a responsible manner that is responsive to the town.

One of the attributes that weighed in Flanagan's favor, O'Donoghue said, was "his emphasis on being a team manager."

Going back to Friday and selectmen's unanimous, 5-0, vote for Flanagan, Selectman Paul Salafia said that an invaluable part of the selection process was toward the end when the two finalists, Flanagan and Kendra Amaral, met with department heads.

Salafia said he talked to managers about

To raze or not to raze?

Demolition delay hearing on historic structures set for Sept. 8

Andover Preservation Commission members will consider a delay to demolishing a 155-year-old farmhouse and barn at 61 Argilla Road when they meet Sept. 8 at a public hearing.

Commission members visited the site early Tuesday morning, sidestepping debris scattered on the grounds and peering through windows of

the red farmhouse and tan barn.

Commission Chairwoman Karen Herman and the rest of the panel will talk about what they saw during the 8 a.m. visit, what the town building inspector advises for the structures, as well as consider reports the owner has assembled on their condition.

Members of the public will have a chance to speak at the

Natural gas pipeline could add \$950K to tax coffers

Andover could rake in nearly \$1 million in new property tax revenue if a plan by energy giant Kinder Morgan to build a high-pressure natural gas line through town ever comes to fruition.

Kinder Morgan officials said last week that Andover would get \$950,000 in tax revenue while Methuen would earn \$700,000 for being hosts to a portion of the gas pipeline. Dracut, meanwhile, could earn more than \$2 million for hosting some of the key

infrastructure for the pipeline system.

When asked how the company arrived at their figures last week, Kinder Morgan Vice President of Public Affairs Allen Fore said the company would pay taxes on the easement it holds on a property, plus the pipeline underneath.

"When you have more pipeline ... you get more money," Fore said of the communities due to receive tax dollars from the project.

Not everyone sees the potential increase in tax dollars as a good thing, however.

John Hess, vice president of

the Andover Village Improvement Society, or AVIS, said the money should not come at the expense of homeowners' property or conservation land.

"No matter what the taxes are, you still have to decide if the destruction to peoples' lives is worth it," said Hess, who recently testified at a federal hearing on the pipeline proposal. "In my opinion, it's not, particularly if the gas isn't really needed."

The pipeline is now slated to go through four miles of Andover. While the company says it is "co-locating" the pipe within existing utility

easements, Hess said the fact is that it parallels powerline corridors. But because the gas lines are not allowed underneath the powerlines, they are built to the side, eating into adjacent properties and crossing over conservation land, some of which is owned by AVIS.

"A lot of houses in West Andover abut the powerline and they usually have a buffer of trees between their homes and the powerlines," he said. "Those trees will be gone. They will be looking at powerlines. And some of those trees are on AVIS property."

In Massachusetts, Tennessee Natural Gas, a Kinder Morgan subsidiary, plans to lay 64 miles of the main pipeline plus several offshoots, known as "laterals."

The state Department of Revenue is responsible for assessing the value of all utility pipelines, whether they are main lines or laterals.

Methuen City Assessor Michele Mastrangelo and Andover Town Assessor David Billard both said they knew nothing of Kinder Morgan's projections, but would not have expected to, because taxing Kinder Morgan on the

pipeline would be the state's responsibility.

"Gas pipelines are valued by the Department of Revenue's Division of Local Services. I would say if (Kinder Morgan is) coming up with estimates, I would assume that they may have been in contact with them," Billard said.

A representative from the Division of Local Services could not be reached for comment.

Steve Crawford, a local public relations consultant hired by Kinder Morgan,

Pre-K program looking for a home

District mulls three or four options to house about 100 students

Two modular classrooms, home to the town's pre-K-Kindergarten program for the last two decades, are slated to be demolished in the next two weeks.

The new, youngest students in the Andover public school district, however, won't have far to go.

Under a plan being called a "temporary solution," the children who would have been in the modulars are moving into the Shawsheen

School next door, joining the rest of the district's Pre-K students in the basement and first floor of the 92-year-old building.

In all, about 100 children are expected to attend the school this fall.

But, most people agree, it's not an ideal situation.

Interim Superintendent Sheldon Berman said he recently took a tour of the school and while staff there "feel fondly about the building, it does not accommodate children with special needs very well."

He said the ramp entering the building is on one side while the elevator that would help disabled students change levels within the building is on the other side.

"I'm not sure how it would work with handicapped access," he said. "There's only one ramp, with installation of the elevator on the other side of the building."

He said he planned on putting together a list of pros and cons for the Shawsheen building and then discussing that and other options for the Pre-K program with the School Committee.

The options being discussed include: rehabbing the Shawsheen School for \$4.5 to \$5 million and keeping the program there permanently; building an addition to the Sanborn School, at a cost of \$5 to \$6 million, and moving the program there; or, moving some of the students to the YMCA on Haverhill Street, which is in the process of renovating its entire facility.

"Those are the three we will look at, or some blend of those," he said. "Over the next month, we will take a look at the pros and cons, and present that in early fall

to the School Committee, getting their judgment on which is the most cost-effective and most effective for children."

'They're old'

Use of the modulators will soon cease to be an option.

The School Committee voted unanimously at its last meeting to demolish the two, modular classrooms located outside the school. Town Purchasing Agent Tom Watkins said the \$17,740 bid has been awarded and the building should be gone by the end of this month.

The building, which contains two classrooms and two restrooms, had been used for years by Andover's pre-Kindergarten program. Before that it was used by SHED, also known as Shawsheen

Extended Day, now located on the campus of Phillips Academy.

According to SHED Executive Director Linda Shottes-Bouchard, the school started in 1984 in the Shawsheen building when it wasn't being used as a public school. When the student population grew, sometime in 1988, according to a history of the SHED program on its web site, the town installed the modular classrooms for SHED to move into while the town used the Shawsheen School as an elementary school.

The classrooms were used for pre-school and pre-K programs right up through this summer.

Public Facilities Director Ed Ataide said the modular was well past its prime.

"There was no need for them and they're old," Ataide said. "They were only supposed to last 10 to 15 years, and these have been there 20 years."

He said they "weren't unsafe," but were "getting tired and we would have to start pouring money into them."

'Shawsheen ... inadequate'

The same could be said for the Shawsheen School itself.

Ataide noted, "the building needs work, but it's still usable as a school." He added, "there's nothing unsafe about the main building."

However, according to a feasibility report completed last August on options for

the Pre-K program, renovating the Shawsheen School was deemed as the least-desirable.

"The Shawsheen Elementary School is currently inadequate to house the proposed PK program," the report concluded. "Improvements to handicapped accessibility and entrance security would require extensive renovations. The resulting school would still have undersized PK classrooms and inadequate toilets."

Building an addition to the Sanborn School was the preferred option identified in the feasibility report, however, at a cost of more than \$6 million.

As a result, said Annie Gilbert, chairwoman of the School Committee, the

program had nowhere to go. "The recommendation was that it was more cost-effective to add to Sanborn than to renovate Shawsheen," she said. "Then we had the idea, before asking the community to add on to Sanborn, why not partner with the YMCA and use some of their space."

She said former superintendent Marinel McGrath along with school finance director Paul Szymanski spent a year in talks with the YMCA.

"But it looks like they won't accommodate us," she said, adding that one of the original proposals called for moving the Pre-K program to the new Bancroft School. "But that site wouldn't accommodate us either," she said. "Now, the Pre-K program

will be there (at Shawsheen) because we didn't have a solution," she said, adding, "It's temporary."

Szymanski said the fee-based Pre-K program includes about 100 students, plus staff, and offers partial and all-day options. Carol Green is the director.

A Kindergarten-Grade 2 program had been located at the site, he said, but has since been moved out with the students redistricted to other schools in Andover. The Pre-K program will be housed in the basement and first floor with the upper floor left vacant.

He noted that the building "needs a fair amount of work" but that "decisions needs to be made: Is it cost-effective to put dollars in for education purposes?"

The town's Health Department director, Thomas Carbone, said senior management met as a group first with one of the finalists then the other. He said they look forward to working with Flanagan, though he thinks it will be a challenge for everyone,

working with someone new. The former town manager, Reginald "Buzz" Stapczynski, retired on June 30 after 25 years at the helm. Carbone said the town enjoys the advantage of having strong senior management — assembled over the years by Stapczynski — who know what they are doing and are leaders in their fields.

Selectman Robert Landry put change at the forefront of deciding factors when it came to choosing the next town manager.

"In my view, Andrew Flanagan will be the change agent that Andover needs," Landry said. "He represents a new generation of municipal leadership who will bring transparency, fiscal responsibility, and most importantly, accountability to Andover residents."

Flanagan's salary will start, as advertised, at between \$165,000 and \$185,000. There may be a provision for merit raises, depending on the negotiations, O'Donoghue said.

Negotiations typically center on compensation, and less so on vacation, bereavement and other leave considerations, while insurance is predetermined, she said.

The search that resulted in Flanagan's selection was an exhaustive seven-month screening and selection process. Screening committee members, led by Town Moderator Sheila Doherty, combed through 36 applications, identifying and interviewing seven candidates before narrowing the field to the two finalists.

Don Robb, a member of the screening panel, said he liked Flanagan's interaction with the committee's members.

The finalist met with selectmen as a group and individually. They also fielded questions from the public at a forum.

The public was highly engaged in the process, board members said. They received emails, texts, phone calls and in-person comments from Andover residents with ideas about who should be the next town manager.

Vice Chairman Alex Vispoli said he received 22 phone calls from residents a day before Friday's unanimous vote for Flanagan.

hearing. The Preservation Commission has the authority to impose a delay to demolition of up to a year.

A delay typically gives the Commission time to find new locations for structures slated for destruction as well as to photograph and otherwise document them.

Andover Building Inspector Chris Clemente joined Tuesday's site visit.

He thinks the barn, or at least parts of it, could be saved.

"I think the barn is salvageable with 'TLC,'" he said. "The home needs to come down."

But based on what he has seen of the house, all from the outside, it looks like it should come down, he said. Part of the first floor is collapsing into the basement, he said.

Clemente said he will recommend a red 'X' be painted on the house, and perhaps the barn, indicating to police and firefighters that they should not enter.

The buildings do not appear to pose imminent danger of collapse, but someone entering the house could be hurt due to the poor condition, he said.

At the Tuesday, Sept. 8, public hearing, 6:30 p.m. in the second-floor conference room at the Town Offices Building, the preservation panel will also consider the owner's intentions for rebuilding on the lot.

The owner, Justin Silverio of JS2 Homes in Methuen, wants to build a new single-family home on the 0.69-acre property, after razing the barn and house.

JS2 Homes bought the property, a corner lot, from Barbara and Lester Tomkinson of Chelmsford on May 20, for \$300,000, according to the Essex County North Registry of Deeds.

Andover Youth Services Director Bill Fahey was

at the site walk as well on Tuesday. He said he would be interested in salvaging at least parts of the barn and house, if they are available, for use at the Cormier Youth Center.

Silverio told Preservation Commission members that Fahey and Glenn Wilson, assistant director at Andover Youth Services, had come to see the property earlier and wanted to take parts of the barn and house.

Herman said the demolition delay review needed to proceed in its proper order, and it was too early to be talking about salvage.

"This is kind of jumping way ahead of our process," The Argilla Road

property has been deemed historic and was once home to the Rennie family, who had strawberry fields on Argilla Road.

Much of Argilla Road was once strawberry fields, and home to families who farmed those fields, said James Batchelder, a member of the Preservation Commission. He grew up on Argilla Road.

At an earlier Preservation Commission hearing on 61 Argilla, a large number of neighbors voiced frustrations over the long neglected property.

Several of them spoke of wanting to see any historic elements preserved but say the buildings are a blight and need to be removed.

emphasized the numbers are only estimates and said they are based on Kinder Morgan's prior work in the energy field.

"These estimates are based on the experience we've had in Massachusetts for the many miles of pipeline that we currently operate, and national experience where we have installed new equipment and understand the current market value," Crawford said.

The value of the pipelines in the ground depreciates over time, Fore explained. The figures available now would apply only to the first year after the pipeline is installed, he added.

Last fiscal year, the section of pipeline owned by Tennessee Natural Gas that currently exists in Andover was valued at \$14,000, according to records available online from the Massachusetts Department of Revenue. In Methuen, the company's existing pipeline was valued at \$4.3 million.

According to information published by Kinder Morgan, the company paid about \$5.6 million in taxes in Massachusetts in 2014.

The Northeast Energy Direct project calls for 416 miles of new pipeline stretching from Pennsylvania to Dracut. Officials have said that the entire length of the new pipeline in Massachusetts will be co-located along existing utility corridors in the ground. In Methuen and Andover, where offshoot natural gas lines are planned, existing lines in the ground will be removed and replaced with larger pipes.

Methuen City Council Chairman Ronald Marsan, who spoke against the pipeline at a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission hearing on the project Tuesday night, said the \$700,000 figure does not change his mind.

"I don't know where they have come up with those numbers ... but I don't think that money is the motivator for residents," he said. "We have no direct gain from the pipeline coming through our city. The people who are affected by it, their quality of life isn't going to change with money."

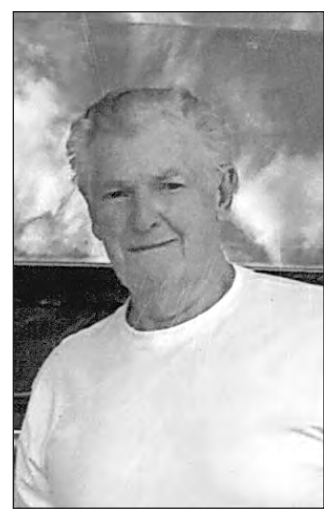
Mr. George A. Blaine, 85

Karma put on notice by Board of Health

A sushi restaurant on North Main Street has been cited for numerous violations related to kitchen maintenance and improper testing of sushi rice.

On Monday, the owners of Karma Restaurant, 209 North Main St., were ordered by the Andover Board of Health to undergo monthly inspections and return to the board in six months for a review.

The restaurant opened a year ago and in that time has been cited for a total of 19 critical violations in five inspections, according to a report that Andover Health Department Director Tom Carbone provided the Board of Health.

Violations and inspector concerns relate to the testing and recording of the pH level of sushi rice, food storage, general cleanliness and access to hand-washing stations, according to the report.

Owner Iverson Guo told the board he has hired a professional food service

consultant to train his staff, and they will focus on educating the staff on proper procedures.

"I will do my best to educate them," Guo said.

Guo said part of the problem was related to the high turnover of employees and communication difficulties.

He also said he was too focused on expanding his operations — he and his partner Jason Xu own another restaurant — and needed to pay greater attention to training.

Board of Health member Gopala Dwarakanath told Guo that business is one

thing but, "we are concerned with the safety of the food served to people of Andover."

He urged the owners to educate their workers, not just tell them not to do something, and to properly maintain a log of their sushi rice testing.

The board voted unanimously, 3-0, to require Karma to receive monthly inspections by Food Service Solutions, have town staff conduct follow-up inspections and to return to the board in six months for a re-evaluation of the restaurant's record.

The board has the authority to revoke or suspend a restaurant's food service license.

Carolyn Dymond and Pamela Linzer are the other two health board members.

It is estimated that food-borne diseases cause 76 million illnesses, 325,000 hospitalizations and 5,000 deaths in the United States each year, according to a food safety presentation given to the board later at Monday's meeting.

South Church teens reach out and serve

This summer the teens weeded New Hampshire farm fields and doled fresh vegetables to the hungry at Lawrence pantries.

They headed to Boston and helped homeless artists get back to creating art, and helped them sell their works.

When they were not volunteering at other locations they found time to fire dodge balls at each other, partake in intense foursquare games and laugh over the blue lips and brain freezes they got from eating endless Fla-Vor-Ice.

They are 60 teens from the South Church Summer of Service program.

Jennifer Murray, 23, who runs the youths' activities and service projects at the church, says service fuels fun for the 13- to 18-year-olds.

For three weeks in July, they worked daily, rotating between volunteer posts. The places included Johnson's Highland View Farm in Windham, food pantries in Lawrence, the Boys and Girls Club of Lawrence and Common Art in Boston.

They weeded fields, mopped floors, cleaned windows, served lunches and played games with kids.

More locally, here in Andover, they have volunteered on AVIS Trails and at ABC House.

Seamus Curtin, who just graduated from Andover High School and is headed this fall for American University in Washington, D.C., to study international relations, says the volunteer gigs can inspire a desire to go deeper into community service.

He worked an internship at Common Art, in Boston, serving lunches, handing out brushes and paints and doing art himself.

The work the young people do makes a difference.

At Johnson's farm their toil allows the family to donate fresh produce to people in need, says Christy Johnson, of the Johnson Farm.

Armed with hoes and donning hats and gloves, they dug into the good earth, weeding rows of zucchini, yellow squash, green beans, onions and tomatoes.

"They are good workers because they have the heart," Johnson said.

Linda Zimmerman, executive director of Neighbors in Need, which distributes food to folks who need it in Lawrence and elsewhere, said the Summer of Service volunteers were at all

the Neighbors in Need food pantries.

The pantries help 650 families a week, providing them

a few days worth of food. One of those recipients

was Frank Phillips, 77, a retired box factory worker who receives a small pension from his years of labor.

One morning in July he walked away from the pantry at the former South Congregational Church in Lawrence with a bag of fresh zucchini and summer squash.

He said he and his wife need the food.

Zimmerman said Summer of Service gives young people an outlet for doing good works.

She is a member of the South Church in Andover, with a congregation of about 700.

Murray, a St. Anselm's College graduate who is enrolling this fall in the divinity program at Andover Newton Theological School, said she has heard from parents that their children in Summer of Service like the responsibility they gain from the program.

They feel trusted and capable.

Tim Sorota, 18, also a Class of 2015 graduate at Andover High School and Summer of Service volunteer, said service and fun has been a staple of the program for 20 years.

He suspects the same will be true for the next 20 years.

Faith Lutheran volunteers pitch in to help Motor City

First there was help for Hurricane Katrina victims. This summer, neighborhoods in Detroit needed a helping hand cleaning up over 3,000 vacant lots and buildings.

So the local teens from Faith Lutheran Church in Andover responded - again.

For six days last month - July 14 to 20 - 16 local high school students and three adult leaders from the South Main Street church attended The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) National Youth Gathering in Detroit. They quickly went to work helping organizations with various clean-up projects.

"In Detroit, these kids helped grass roots organizations already there, clean up some neighborhoods and beautify and board up abandoned buildings," Tom Schauer, director of Youth Ministry and Programs, wrote in an email.

Schauer said his group was part of a Lutheran

national youth gathering that only happens once every three years. The gathering attracts over 30,000 young adult Lutherans from around the country.

"The kids spend one day in the convention hall, one day dedicated to service in the community and one day getting to know the other kids in our geographic region, in this case, New England," Schauer wrote. "There was also a whole lot of time for fun and sightseeing, too."

The teens helped board up 319 homes, clear 3,200 vacant lots of debris, distribute 1,425 backpacks, install 36 urban gardens and build 99 picnic tables, among other projects.

They also donated 78.8 gallons of blood and helped gather 1 million donated diapers for distribution.

In all, they helped improve 600 neighborhoods.

Schauer said it wasn't all work. "Every night of the Youth Gathering, the kids met at Detroit's Ford Field to hear Christian rock bands

and inspirational speakers," he said. "It was a great experience."

Every year, the organizers of the annual youth gathering choose a city that is in need of service. The last two youth gatherings were held in New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina. The next National Gathering will be in Houston, Texas, in three years.

Brainiac campers build a brain

Children in the week-long summer camp KITE (Kaleidoscope Institute for Thinking Excellence) used their brains this summer to build a paper sculpture as part of a "Brain Blast" program.

Girls-only engineering camp highlighted science skills

Girl Power could have been the theme for a week-long camp at UMass-Lowell earlier this month where 15 high school students from around the region gathered to try their hands at engineering and science.

During the program at UMass Lowell's "Engineering for Sustainability" camp, students learned what that concept really means and how they can apply it in areas like renewable energy, recycling, water treatment and the reduction of toxic substances in business and everyday life.

Open only to female high-school students, the camp's goals included helping them explore engineering

as a possible career. While women represent 47 percent of the nation's total workforce, they make up less than a quarter of the workers in many engineering and science occupations, according to statistics from the National Science Foundation and U.S. Department of Labor.

Students participating in the camp were from Andover, Bridgewater, Chelmsford, Groton, Lawrence, Lowell, North Andover, Northborough, Shrewsbury, Tyngsboro, West Boylston and West Newbury.

The camp included design-and-build team projects like an inexpensive water-purification system, an electricity-generating wind turbine, a system

to generate energy from waste, a model home that uses solar power and environmentally friendly materials for use in cleaning. Daily "tech talks" with UMass Lowell faculty researchers from the Francis College of Engineering and other experts were featured, along with tours of locations around the community to see sustainability in action.

Representatives of UMass Lowell's DifferenceMaker Program taught the high-school students about entrepreneurship and how to develop and pitch ideas to solve business, community and other issues.

Among the attendees at the camp were Andover residents Emily Care and Sophia Ju.

Change is in the air

Change is in the air.

While the summer heat and the calendar say one thing, those brown, dry leaves shuffling along the ground along with a glint of red and yellow in trees above say something else.

With Poms Pond open an extra week this year, and students going back to school in early September, it seems there is still plenty of time left for some summer fun.

Still, change is in the air.

An interim superintendent has taken the reins of Andover schools. The high school has a new principal. Bancroft Elementary has a new interim principal. The town has a new manager. Police are hiring two, new employees to tackle a worsening heroin and opiate problem.

Even the Townsman is changing, with a new editor and new reporters.

There is also a major milestone looming, with the pending completion of the Cormier Youth Center.

While change brings about opportunity, sometimes it can be difficult.

Three downtown businesses recently disappeared, victims of lagging sales and poor foot traffic, among other woes.

Reacting to changing demographics and evolving customer preferences, the restaurant Brasserie 28 in Elm Square has become the Elm Square Oyster Co.

At the other end of Main Street, a mini-renaissance is underway in Andover Village Square, where new restaurants and eateries are joining with existing businesses such as a renovated and expanded Dunkin' Donuts and the seemingly timeless but faithful Lantern Brunch.

Change may also be coming to some neighborhoods, such as those on Elm Street where a developer wants to erect an assisted living project. For years, the site was made up of a grassy field, a few trees and a stone wall. If the project goes through, that hill will be topped with a large building and become home to dozens of elderly residents. A lighted driveway will wind down through landscaped grounds to a busy Elm Street. Change.

At Strawberry Hill Farm on Lowell Street, the Loosigian family worked the property for decades, selling fruits and vegetables from a roadside stand. The farm, the last one of its kind in Andover, hasn't been used in a couple of years. The fields lie fallow. That too may soon change, if a proposal to erect an assisted living development there goes through.

Neighbors in both cases have fought tooth and nail against the projects. They don't want to see their neighborhoods change.

The Preservation Commission is mulling some changes as well. A developer wants to demolish an old farmhouse and barn on Argilla Road that were links to the town's historic strawberry industry. The buildings have fallen into disrepair and probably should be demolished. Once they are gone, the town will no longer have a visible link to that piece of its agricultural past. It will be recalled in the ample and growing files of the Andover Historical Society, which is also undergoing change with the departure of one of its long-time staff members, Carrie Midura, profiled in this week's Townsman.

The Preservation Commission wants to stop another, proposed demolition - this time of the old Franciscan Center on River Road. It is a fascinating structure with a fascinating history, but a developer wants to tear it down to make way for a condominium complex. Change? Possibly.

As the saying goes, the only constant is change. The question is, what kind of change do we want? And how do we get there?

WEB QUESTION

Last week's question:

Do you think the process of finding a new town manager worked and that the best two candidates were found?

Yes. It was exhaustive. The selectmen and town had plenty of time to vet the candidates. 6 votes, or 31.6 percent.

No. They should have re-started the search process and found new candidates. 9 votes, or 47.4 percent.

Not sure. I didn't get a good enough feeling for the two candidates although I think they both seem nice. 2 votes, or 10.5 percent.

Doesn't matter. The selectmen and school committee really run the show around here. 2 votes, or 10.5 percent.

This week's question:

Poms Pond is staying open for an extra week this year because most of the lifeguards are going back to school later than normal. Do you think Poms Pond stays open long enough for the season?

No. The season is too short for what we pay. Besides, the weather is warm through September.

Yes. It is the perfect-length season. Kids get to swim during the summer and attend camp. Besides, it would be too expensive to hire adult lifeguards to stay there through the end of August and into September.

Historic preservation needed before buildings fall into disrepair

Editor, Townsman:

Well-preserved historical homes are a testament to the artistry and ingenuity of early architects and builders. Often these buildings exhibit unique defining features and styles that no longer form part of contemporary architecture. They have intrinsic value in the quality of materials used in their construction and are reminders of an area's aesthetic and cultural history. Ergo, Andover, like many cities and towns worldwide, has a preservation commission that has "authority over changes to historic properties that would irreparably alter or destroy their character." (Andover Preservation Commission website.)

Before us is the case of 61 Argilla Road, a Civil War-era home that once was the center of operations for a 29-acre strawberry farm. The new owner proposes demolition of the antique home and adjacent barn given the irreparable, deteriorated and failing condition of these structures. One can hardly argue that there has been egregious neglect over the past 25 years as evidenced in the rotten roofing timbers and inordinate amount of debris that has cluttered this property. There are legitimate concerns that the buildings and property represent a potentially serious hazard.

Where was the authority on the part of the Andover Preservation Commission during the years that the integrity of this historical resource was blatantly being compromised? Why wasn't this neglect treated with a specific historic preservation ordinance to address changes that were irreparably altering and destroying the character of this historic property?

I hope the Andover Preservation Commission members learn from this debacle that their collective experience and expertise in historic architecture and preservation should encourage collaborative conservancy of our historic buildings whether "triggered by a building permit" or in case of overt disregard of the building's

defining features and historical integrity.

Stop pipeline by cutting energy use

Editor, Townsman:

Stop the Pipeline signs and protests are held with the best of intentions, but don't undercut the business case for the pipeline - rising natural gas use in New England. Until our region's natural gas usage begins to fall, and sadly nothing in the "Protests erupt outside hearing" article addresses this, the pressure to build the pipeline will prove to be unstoppable. Fortunately, Andover has people like Anil Navkal who have taken action to reduce natural gas usage by embracing solar energy. About half our electricity is generated from natural gas, so every watt saved or generated from solar reduces our natural gas consumption and undercuts the need for the pipeline.

The Solarize Andover campaign resulted in 88-plus residential solar installations, saving approximately 500 MWh per year, and the proposed net metering contract (assuming the cap is raised) will save a further 4,500 MWh a year. It's a tremendous start, but we need to do more to block the Kinder-Morgan pipeline.

Residents of existing homes looking to stop the pipeline can get energy audits to identify and install insulation improvements. That saves money on heating and cooling costs while reducing natural gas use. Further reductions can be accomplished by installing solar panels. It is unfortunate that not every existing home is suitable for solar, but if you received a solar invitation from Solarize Andover a few years back, then your house is suitable. Within half dozen years of installation the system would be paid for and you would be enjoying free electricity. Even better, your natural gas savings would start right way.

While new construction can increase natural gas usage, it also provides opportunities to minimize that increase because the best time to plan for insulation and solar is before the

foundation is poured. Anyone in the market for a new house who is concerned about the pipeline should ask if the house will be insulated beyond what Stretch Energy Code requires and if solar capacity will (or at least can) be installed for a net electricity bill of zero.

A new home will stand for decades, so the energy decisions made today will also last for decades, but builders are not going to provide extra insulation or solar unless we ask them to.

Stop the pipeline protests and litigation might delay construction of the natural gas pipeline, but if natural gas demand continues to rise, the pipeline will get built. The only sure way to stop it is to increase energy efficiency and renewable electricity so our natural gas usage declines year after year. Once that happens, Kinder-Morgan will willingly abandon the project.

Bait and Switch? AYS not helping all kids

Editor, Townsman:

While I appreciate the severity of the drug problem in our town, I feel there is another issue that is not being considered as we investigate solutions. Specifically, are we getting what we intended out of the money spent in the Andover Youth Services (AYS) department? After reading the articles in the Townsman 'Drug battle in high gear' (July 30) and 'Chief weighs in on drug epidemic' (July 16) I couldn't help but think, why are we looking to add two people to our Police Department when we already have AYS? Didn't we just approve money for a social worker at AYS? I feel, a bait and switch may have taken place and before we commit to a solution, we should be taking a closer look at what we already have.

It was my understanding that AYS was created after a number of suicides in town to address the needs of middle and high school children with a focus on the at-risk or marginalized population. However, after my experiences as a parent and having working closely with AYS, I am not so sure that the original focus still holds true.

My first experience occurred when my son was at Andover High School and he was one of the 'at risk' children. He hung out with a group of boys who were in the same place. My attempts to get assistance or guidance from AYS were not successful. To the best of my knowledge, none of these boys were being assisted by AYS either. At the time, I had my own issues to deal with so I didn't really give it much thought. Note: Two of these same boys are included in the seven total overdose deaths and another was in the video 'The other side of Andover' because he is a recovering addict.

Most recently, I contacted AYS to ask for some suggestions for a friend who has a child in Andover who is in crisis. The child's mother is trying to work with the school and the police. She was (and still is) at her wits end so I offered to contact AYS for her since I had worked with them and it seemed like a logical place to start. I called AYS multiple times and I did not receive a call back from anyone at AYS. Note: This happened in October of 2014, after \$60,000 was approved at the 2014 Town Meeting for an AYS employee to work with young people dealing with addiction.

This pattern of behavior confirmed what I felt when I worked with AYS as part of the Ultimate Frisbee Program. The focus at AYS has shifted from its original intent, to address the needs of the middle and high school population, to raising money, building a building, maintaining a positive image so they can raise money and providing programs for a relatively small group of children in town. As residents, we are subjected to emotional pleas for money, headcount, etc., without a responsible focus on results. How do we measure the success of the money being spent there? How many children are being served by this organization and is the focus still as intended?

The town of Andover needs to take a closer look at the effectiveness of what we already have and how it is or is not meeting the needs of the children in town before we add additional resources.

Remembrance for Ironstone Farm founder Sunday

Dick Donovan paired horses with the handicapped

For decades, Richard "Dick" Donovan touched the lives of many with disabilities through equine-focused activities and therapy programs at Ironstone Farm.

Now, the community Donovan fostered through Ironstone and Challenge Unlimited, the nonprofit that owns and runs the farm, is coming together Sunday to honor his efforts and celebrate his life. Donovan died June 15 at age 84.

Deedee O'Brien, the farm's executive director, praised Donovan's spirit and determination in developing Ironstone Farm into a center to help those with disabilities.

"What he did was give people with disabilities the opportunity to try and reach their greatest potential," she said. "He kind of gave them that extra chance to take chances and gain that confidence and gain that self-esteem."

Donovan grew up in Somerville and entered the service after high school in the late 1940s. After an accident ended his time in the service, he graduated from Boston University and worked at a pharmaceutical company before becoming a science teacher and leading the Billerica High School science department for 14 years.

He purchased the land that became Ironstone Farm in 1960 and set to work clearing the land and building a house, barn and paddocks. He retired from teaching in 1976 to follow his dream of raising and training thoroughbred performance horses at the farm.

"He's the person who designed everything, built everything literally with his own hands, funded everything in the beginning, provided the horses," O'Brien said. "It's his spirit that has kept this going all these years."

Along with breeding horses, Donovan opened up the farm to field trips of children with disabilities to come and enjoy the animals, which became the start of the Ironstone's programs for those with disabilities.

He expanded that aim

when he founded Challenge Unlimited in 1983 with the mission of using the farm and horses to provide therapies for disabled children. By the early 1990s, more than 200 people were participating in programs at the farm each week.

In the next decade, Donovan redesigned the farm, building a therapy building and purchasing a select group of horses. Challenge Unlimited purchased the farm in 2001, and Donovan remained as farm manager, designing and helping build an indoor arena for year-round programming. He also purchased two abutting properties to allow the farm to expand to the 19 acres it is today.

Now, through Challenge Unlimited and Ironstone Therapy, another nonprofit, Ironstone Farm annually provides therapies for more than 1,000 people with physical, emotional and cognitive disabilities, including equine encounters and therapeutic riding. The programs serve a wide variety of people from combat veterans with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder to at-risk teenagers to those diagnosed with cancer.

"His real legacy is all the people whose lives have been touched and changed by this place that he's created," O'Brien said.

O'Brien started working with Donovan in 1972 and considered him a close friend and mentor. She called his "can-do spirit" infectious and said it inspired people to stay involved with the farm.

Those who have been involved with Ironstone over the years will have the opportunity to come together and honor Donovan and his work during a celebration of his life starting at 4 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 23, at the farm, 450 Lowell St., Andover.

"We're doing it right there so that people can feel him there and experience what

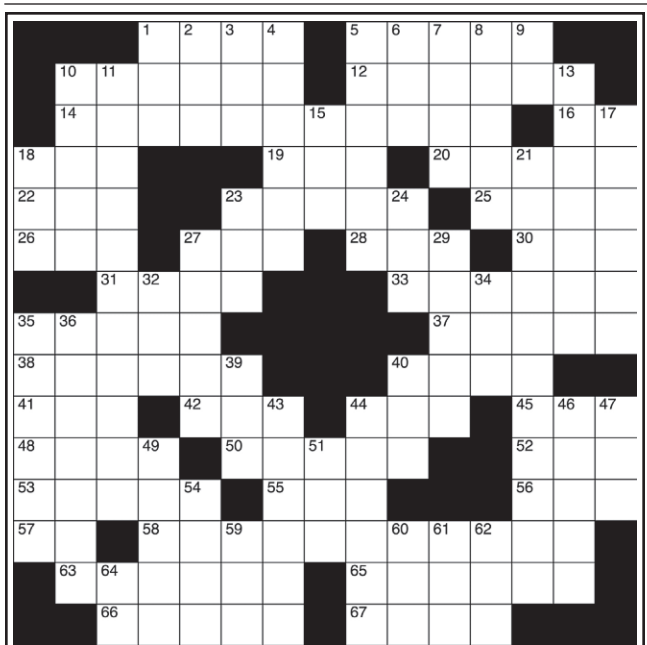

50-year-old electrical engineer lights up Andover Outdoor Challenge by finishing first

David Bunting, chairman of the Andover Trails Committee, describes Jerry Witt as "a very fit person."

Indeed, Witt, 50, an electrical engineer who lives in Andover, was honored last Monday evening for being the first person to complete the Andover Outdoor Challenge, a series of physically taxing activities that are done entirely within the town limits.

These are the tasks – and they must all be done within 2015 to qualify as an Andover Outdoor Challenge finisher:

- Hike the Bay Circuit Trail across Andover. It's about 17 miles.
- Paddle a canoe or kayak on the Shawsheen River in Andover.
- Bike across Andover.
- Cross-country ski or snowshoe to the top of Holt Hill, which at 370 feet above sea level is the highest point in Essex County.
- Swim, fish, or paddle in Field, Foster's and Poms ponds.
- Mountain bike 5 miles of trails in Harold Parker State Forest.

"I like to stay active," Witt said in a bit of understatement. He has run the Boston Marathon a few times as well as the Vermont 50-Mile Race. He especially enjoys trail running with his dog Nahla, a Hungarian Vizsla. Witt began the Challenge in March, when he put on his cross country skis and ascended Holt Hill, which on a clear day commands grand views of Boston and points beyond. He completed that feat in about 15 minutes, he said.

Riding his mountain bike along 5 miles of trails in Harold Parker State Forest took considerably longer than 15 minutes.

"That was great," he said. While he paddled a kayak on the Shawsheen, from the Tewksbury town line to Ballardvale, then to the Horn Bridge, he settled for fishing on the three ponds.

Witt and his wife Krista have three children, ages 16, 14 and 10.

Bunting presented Witt with a patch that recognizes him as the first finisher of the Andover Outdoor Challenge, which

Instead more than 100 people registered, he said.

"It's not a race," Golden said. "The idea is to enjoy

Andover." This town is noted for its schools, both private and public, he pointed out. Its outdoor recreational opportunities, he said, are "equally important."

75 Years Ago August 15, 1940

Andover will have one more liquor license to grant this year as a result of the increase shown in the recent census, provided that the town again votes for license for liquors to be served on the premises. The town went up into the 11,000 class and under state law this entitles the town to one more license.

The annual water carnival at the Poms pond town bathing beach will be held on Saturday, August 24th. The beach at Poms and also the one at Husseys have been experiencing unusually large crowds the past few weeks because of the weather conditions.

50 Years Ago August 19, 1965

Carrie Midura leaving Historical Society Head of PR, Midura leaving to focus on home sewing business

Residents wondering about neighborhood or town history usually call the Andover Historical Society for answers.

And Programs Director Carrie Midura usually had the answer.

Midura also runs the town's Farmers Market this year and livens up numerous town events with costumed characters from Andover's past, such as this year's Andover Day on Sept. 12 which will feature an Andover "1829 house party" that Midura is organizing.

She's an accomplished seamstress with a passion for historic costumes so working at the Historical Society fit her like a well-threaded needle on a sewing machine. She came on board in October 2007.

She leaves her job at the end of the month to run her own sewing business.

"I will miss Andover but I'll still be around. I'll miss walking on Main Street where someone always says 'hi'. That's what I will miss the most," said Midura, who moved her desk from the back of the historical society's museum on Main Street to just steps from the front door. "I just thought it was a better location."

It is simply time for a change in her professional life, she said. Sewing classes are very popular these days and Midura is looking

forward to sharing her skills. She just finished a weekly DCS sewing course for mothers and daughters that attracted 16 students.

Moms are dusting off bobbins and retrieving seldom-used sewing machines from their basements for class or borrowing one from Midura, who has six sewing machines in her private collection which she happily shares with sewing buffs.

Meanwhile, their daughters learn about the basics of sewing and how Midura made her prom dress and her date's tuxedo for their Marlboro High School prom.

Beginners usually make pajamas, skirts and tunics, she said.

Midura was also technically savvy at the Historical Society as she designed its website, event posters and numerous mailings about events. With a volunteer staff of about 130, she organized their assignments, including house, garden and walking tours around town.

"Andover's Historical Society is large and very involved in town. That's why I took this job," said Midura, 41, who worked at historical museums in Concord and

Harvard prior to Andover. "Andover is serious about its history ... I enjoyed that."

When pressed for a favorite historical event highlighting Andover's past, she said the Christmas Tree Exhibit is on the list. She organized the fundraising event every year since it started in 2008. The exhibit theme is always connected to the society's collection. Last year, the theme was toys as there are many old toys in the collection.

The exhibit tripled in participants in six years, growing from 12 decorated trees to 39 last year. Six board members decorated those 12 initial trees while about 225 volunteers from across town decorated trees last year.

"Our collection inspires the decorators every year and it's a great way for them to learn about our collection," she said.

Dressing up in historical costumes was always fun for her and she plans to do it one more time as she is taking part in Andover Day's 1829 house party being held at the Historical Society on Main Street.

"I enjoy being connected to the past and learning," said Midura who watches very little television and enjoys finding very old recipes and trying them out and reading non-fiction historical books. I've always got to be doing something with my hands. I'm not one to just sit around."

Andover, Methuen girls combine for silver

"Everything clicked," agreed Gibson. "We managed to hold our own the entire race, against really fierce competition."

"This was my favorite boat this summer," added Eberth. "We had two separate teams, Methuen and Essex, with different skill sets, join together so well. Oftentimes during the race I felt like I was rowing by myself, in a good way, because we were moving so swiftly as one."

Eberth and Gibson brought a wealth of veteran experience to this young crew.

Carter and Briere are both original members of Methuen Crew who learned to row in the spring of 2014. They were invited to race with the Essex high performance team this summer.

Carter said, "Right off the start, we pulled away from everyone with Y-Quad bow.

RACE TO THE END OF SUMMER

Beach stickers sold out and day trippers were frequent visitors as the sun was out more than usual at Poms Pond this summer. So, the town's only public swimming hole stayed open an extra week.

"We made enough money to pay the lifeguards for another week ... it's not a habit, but we're doing it this summer," said Kim Stamas, Department of Community Services Director.

Poms Pond was scheduled to close last Sunday, Aug. 16, but will now close on Sunday, Aug. 23 at 6 p.m. The Pond will be closed Wednesday, Aug. 19, as a private party reserved the Pond earlier this year, Stamas said. The special beach day for seniors will also be held Thursday, Aug. 20 as planned during pond hours, she said.

Typically, the college-age lifeguard staff is not available in late August as they head back to college that week. This year, Stamas said more lifeguards seem to be attending colleges that have September start dates. For example, UMass-Amherst starts classes on Sept. 8 while Colby College in Maine starts classes on Sept. 9.

"Lifeguards are available so we can be open," Stamas said.

Stamas is still very firm about having enough lifeguards at Poms Pond because of what happened to Molly Bish. In the summer of 2000, Bish, 16 and a lifeguard, disappeared while working at a pond in Warren. She was never found.

Stamas remembers the Bish story quite well and as a result, pledged that Poms Pond will always have enough lifeguards or it will be closed. And, multiple lifeguards will be on staff when it is open. She said a lifeguard staff of 12 to 13 will work at Poms Pond next week.

Hopefully, the sun will continue to shine as rainy days have been minimal this summer and that's been good for the local beach business.

"We've only had four days of rain ... that's really unusual. We usually have more," Stamas said.

Day trippers pay \$5 to \$20 per person to visit the pond — weekends are most expensive — and 40 to 60 of them came every day, Stamas said. Beach stickers, which cost \$150 per car, sold out with 450 stickers purchased by town residents. The half-price early bird sticker special held in June was well-received, Stamas said.

That adds up to covering lifeguard salaries for next week. Any money made at the Pond goes back in the Pond budget and this year it means an extra week for summer fun as Andover schools open Wednesday, Sept. 2.

And, the pond water has passed its weekly bacteria test every week this summer. In years past, Poms was closed a few times as the water did not pass the purity tests.

"It's really been a great summer for us," Stamas said.

She said stand-up paddleboarding will most likely be happening next week at

Poms as it was extremely popular this summer.

"Our stand-up paddle board classes were full ... kids really like it," Stamas

said. The town-run summer day camps with hundreds of kids ended Friday, Aug. 14, so campers will not be

at Poms Pond during its final week. The local beach scene will be a bit quieter but open for business from noon to 6 p.m.

Scarpa battling for starting QB job at Bentley University

When the opportunity to throw his first pass as a college quarterback arrived, C.J. Scarpa simply could not resist.

"It was actually a run play but I had the chance to throw a bubble screen," Scarpa remembered with a laugh. "We were leading Central Connecticut State by a lot. But me wanting to throw, I threw it out there. I don't even think we gained any yardage but it felt great. 'I got back to the sidelines and the coaches looked at me, smiled and said, 'Lets just run the ball.' It was pretty funny."

Who could blame Scarpa. After more than a year of waiting, the record-setting former Andover High QB was back doing what he does best on the gridiron — making plays.

After a year serving as backup quarterback at Bentley University, along with holder on field goals and extra points, now-junior Scarpa is in a fight for the starting quarterback job for the Falcons, which opened pre-season camp last week.

"I'm so excited for the season to begin," said Scarpa. "I am fighting for the quarterback job. We have four quarterbacks and every one of them has a chance. I don't think I can say there's a favorite. We are all working very hard and I love the opportunity to show what I can do."

Listed at 5-foot-9 (but likely closer to 5-foot-6) and 173 pounds on the Bentley roster, Scarpa may not look the part of a football star. But any Andover fan knows his tremendous credentials.

In two seasons as quarterback

for Andover High, Scarpa threw for a stunning 4,429 yards and 32 touchdowns, both believed to be school records.

Scarpa — the son of Andover Hall of Famer Carmen Scarpa — was at his best as a senior when he threw for 2,622 yards and 32 touchdowns. He was intercepted just seven times and led the Warriors to a 10-2 record and the Merrimack Valley Conference Division 1 title, earning All-Scholastic honors.

He then spent his freshman season as a backup for Division 1-AA Elon, before making the decision to transfer to Bentley prior to his sophomore year.

"The move to Bentley has been amazing," said Scarpa. "I felt so comfortable with the guys and with the coaching staff right away. They believed in me. And I was comfortable being back in New England. It was tough to start 1-5, but everyone wanted to keep fighting and we won four of our last five."

Last fall, Scarpa completed 3 of 4 passes for five yards in limited duty at quarterback behind star senior Danny Guadagnoli (3,438 passing yards, 31 TDs).

"It was great to be out there because it has been almost two years since I had played in a game," he said. "Getting some

game time helped me become more comfortable with the college game. I also learned a lot from (Guadagnoli). He was a great QB."

Scarpa's primary role a season ago, however, was the team's starting holder on field goals and extra points.

"It felt great to be out there contributing to the team," he said. "Holding is not an easy job. You have to be ready at all times. And that's not always easy when it's cold or wet outside. You are on the sidelines for a long period, then have to go out and catch a ball in an important situation."

"Against Assumption there were two high snaps I was able to grab it and put it down on a very wet day."

The business major then set his focus on preparing for the 2015 season. Throughout the school year he trained with his teammates, and during the summer he worked out with a trainer in Andover, traveled to Bentley for workouts and with his team competed in 7-on-7s at Harvard.

Now he is set to make that dedication pay off on the field.

"I feel like my game has definitely grown," he said. "I think in high school I knew everything that was going on for the offense and defense. In college there is even more added to the game. There is so much you have to know, and if you don't you're in trouble. But my coaches and teammates have the utmost confidence in me, and I have the utmost confidence in them."

Golden Warrior hoopster Briggs honored at Statehouse

Andover High incoming senior basketball player **Michael Briggs** was honored at the Massachusetts Statehouse on Aug. 4 along with the other inspirational figures named Boston Celtics "Heroes Among Us" for the 2014-15 season.

Briggs was presented with his personalized trophy from the Celtics, a video was shown featuring each honoree and a photo album profiling each Hero was distributed.

Briggs, who has Down syndrome, was originally honored by the Celtics on March 13 during a game against the Orlando Magic.

"It was an unbelievable ceremony," said his father, David Briggs, of the trip to the Statehouse. "They went out of their way to make everyone feel very special. Former Celtics (Basketball Hall of Famer) Satch Sanders and JoJo White were there. Michael was very proud."

HOOPS FOR HOPE

For more than a half of the semifinal it seemed Hoops for Hope championship would come down to the perennial rivals, the foes who have faced off countless times at countless venues with so many titles on the line.

Heading into halftime of the semifinals last Thursday, defending Division 1 North champion Andover held a 10-point lead over Billerica, while arch-enemy Central Catholic appeared in control of Bishop Fenwick.

But despite a dominant 25-point performance for Golden Warriors star **Jillian Webber**, Billerica rallied for a 44-40 win. And across the field house, Fenwick bounced back to best the Raiders 28-24.

In a rematch of last winter's Division 1 North title game — a 41-38 thrilling Andover victory at the Tsongas Center — the Golden Warriors jumped out to a 27-17 lead over Billerica at halftime.

"We started off really well and we fought hard," said recent Andover grad **Talia Dellatto**, who coached the team with ex-teammate **Colleen Caveney**. "I was proud of the girls, but this is definitely not the outcome we wanted."

The Golden Warriors were playing without Eagle-Tribune Super Teamer **Alyssa Casey**. But front court mate Webber was dominant.

The 6-foot forward used a combination of low-post moves and touch from the outside to score a game-high 25 points and grab 14 rebounds.

"Jillian was just unbelievable," said Dellatto. "She was so impressive last year (as a sophomore), and she has dedicated herself to getting even better. You just have to throw the ball into her and good things happen."

But, other than a pair of 3-pointers for **Meghan Stickey**, the Warriors could find little offense outside of their star.

"It is summer league so the most important thing is getting better," said Dellatto. "And we saw improvement. But we are also disappointed we missed the finals."

In the tournament last week, **Jillian Webber** scored 25 points in a 57-39 victory over Lowell, and 21 in a 47-44 win over Triton.

Andover waits for net metering cap to be lifted

NEWS AND WIRE REPORT

BOSTON — Gov. Charlie Baker earlier this month filed a bill to accelerate the maturation of the solar power industry in Massachusetts and then adjust incentives the industry uses to grow.

The bill triggered quick responses, with solar industry and renewable energy advocates offering mixed reviews, National Grid warning the additional subsidies in the bill will cost its customers \$160 million, and a key senator praising Baker for his approach to the issue.

According to the administration, its bill will help the state meet “well ahead of schedule” its goal of 1,600 megawatts of solar power by 2020, while lowering costs associated with large-scale projects and encouraging residential and small business rooftop projects.

“This legislation continues to support and encourage solar power generation while promoting an orderly transition to a stable, equitable, and self-sustaining solar market at a reasonable cost to ratepayers,” Baker wrote in a letter to lawmakers.

The bill, filed in the House, raises private and public caps 2 percent each, which Baker officials say will represent a 50 percent increase in the amount of solar energy available for net metering credits for public entities and a 40 percent increase for private entities. Baker’s plan also calls for maximum use of federal solar investment tax credits prior to their expiration on

Net metering, which allows utility customers with solar panels to sell power back to the grid at retail rates, is one of the incentives offered to encourage clean energy production. Utility companies have resisted efforts to lift the cap, arguing that customers without solar end up paying for it.

Baker’s team said the bill “will provide immediate support for projects being developed in service territories where the caps have already been reached, and provides the Department of Public Utilities with the authority to raise the caps further, as needed in the future.”

Andover is waiting for the cap to be lifted in order to execute a power-purchase agreement with a solar company building an array in Western Massachusetts.

National Grid officials indicated that it would expect to reach the proposed new caps by October, “making it imperative for the Department to immediately begin the process of developing a new, more cost-effective solar program in the Commonwealth.”

“National Grid appreciates

the Baker Administration filing this legislation in an attempt to reign [sic] in the exorbitant subsidies that solar developers continue to enjoy in Massachusetts,” National Grid spokeswoman Mary-Leah Assad said in a statement. “However, we anticipate that raising the cap by the proposed 4 percent would cost our customers an additional \$160 million, on top of the \$1.5 billion in solar subsidies that National Grid customers will already shoulder by 2020.”

She continued, “Massachusetts pays about double for solar what other states are paying for the same energy. We must emphasize that the cost of these subsidies is not borne by the utilities, but by the 99 percent of our Massachusetts electricity customers who do not own solar. As the Baker Administration acknowledges, the solar industry in the Commonwealth is no longer nascent. National Grid is

enthusiastically leading the way to the next chapter of renewable energy, supporting the democratization of solar benefits and ending access to some of the most lucrative subsidies in the nation.”

Eversource spokesman Mike Durand told the News Service Baker’s bill “is a step in the right direction toward addressing the significant costs associated with solar development. We’re always mindful of customer costs and feel it’s crucial that those who aren’t able to install solar generation shouldn’t have to subsidize those who do.”

In his letter to the Legislature, Baker said his bill also proposes changes to transition the state to a “more balanced solar incentive program” upon reaching the 1,600 megawatt goal. Those transition measures quickly drew some skepticism from industry officials and critics who say Baker may be undervaluing solar power’s benefits.

“The current incentives were designed to jump start a new solar industry,” Baker wrote. “This legislation recognizes that the industry has matured, and as we continue our support of solar development, we must also protect ratepayers and provide long-term stability to the solar industry.”

Under Baker’s bill,

reaching the 1,600 megawatt goal will trigger changes in solar generation incentives. Solar generators receiving net metering credits will continue to receive those credits under the existing program for 20 years, Baker wrote, while all residential and small businesses will continue to be excluded from existing or future net metering program caps. All new medium and large-scale solar generators would receive credits equivalent to the monthly commodity price of energy, the governor said, and the state will create a solar incentive program for new solar generators and may create similar incentive programs for other renewable technologies.

Sen. Benjamin Downing, co-chairman of the Legislature’s Committee on Telecommunications, Utilities and Energy, said it was “great” that Baker has recommended short-term cap lifts and also praised the governor’s long-term framework for adjusting incentives.

“I give him a lot of credit. I know it’s not a sort of easy needle to thread,” Downing said.
