HIKE FOR HOPE

Fundraiser to help procure support for a Lazarus House

hen more than 1,000 people take their first steps around downtown Andover this weekend to raise money for Lazarus House, many if not most of them probably have no idea where their money

That's because over the years, Lazarus House has grown from a fairly simple, 5-bed emergency shelter to an enormous complex of buildings and programs serving thousands of people a year.

From those early days in 1982, 33 years have passed and the organization has held 16 Hike for Hope events - one of several fundraising tools the organization uses to augment its \$9 million budget.

"Hike for Hope brings the community together," said Maureen Burns-Murtha, events manager at Lazarus House Ministries. "Churches come, schools come, families come. Because it's been 15 years, we're starting to see different generations coming back. We're very grateful to live in such a generous community."

Lazarus House Ministries has become a multifaceted non-profit corporation that provides emergency shelters, advocacy services, a food pantry and soup kitchen, and development training to a growing population of people in need. The most recent addition to the arsenal

AEA President Kerry Costello told selectmen Monday that the teachers' union would be moving their office from the 434-squarefoot space on the first floor at 20 Main St.

The AEA's rental, \$615 a month, was deemed below market value by town officials earlier this year, and was tentatively sched-

uled for a 34-percent increase. The AEA has been renting as an at-will tenant the past three months, said Ed Ataide, Andover deputy director of plant and

Concussion policy helps student-athletes

It's good to see the school department taking a closer look at its concussion policy.

The state requires cities and towns to revisit its concussion policies every couple of years, and this year, it seems, Andover High School, the Andover School Committee, school administrators and the athletic department are all taking the problem seriously.

According to a story in this week's Townsman by reporter Gabriella Cruz, the schools are using a software program that uses a series of tests to establish a baseline of cognition. If a young athlete gets a concussion, they must take the tests again. The new tests are compared to the old tests to determine whether an athlete is still suffering the effects of what is essentially an invisible injury. If the tests show the student is still suffering the effects of a concussion, they must be kept off the field of play.

One young woman quoted in the story, Melissa Pennington, who graduated from AHS in 2010, told Cruz: "I didn't have a broken bone or a cast. Sometimes, people assume that teenagers in high school just don't want to do their homework, so I wasn't taken seriously."

Sadly, that happened - and probably still happens - all too often. And it's not just skeptical teachers thinking the pupil is slacking off. It's also parents who want their child on the field of play, competing and winning, scoring goals, dominating the opposition. Athletic Director Don Doucette noted that the concussion policy that has been in place the last couple of years is already bearing fruit with regard to parents.

"Every year," he said, "we have fewer parents fighting to get clearance for their kids to return to play early, so we must continue to provide as much information as possible."

Coaches can also be complicit in the concussion cover-up, however. The pressure to win can be great, especially in a community such as Andover, where success in athletics can be just as important as success in academics - sometimes more so.

As Interim Superintendent Sheldon "Shelley" Berman put it: "There's an influence telling kids to tough it out when it comes to concussions. We just can't do that. This is too serious, the damage is too significant."

As such, it is incumbent on everyone involved in the student-athlete's life to be watchful of concussions. During games, athletic trainers should always be available to conduct sideline tests. If an athlete tests positive, that information needs to be passed along to coaches, parents and pediatricians. Follow-up computerized testing needs to be done as soon as possible, and the athlete needs to be checked by their physician. Then, everyone just has to take a deep breath and wait until the athlete is ready to return to the field of play.

As Pennington pointed out, she suffered from something known as "second-impact syndrome," resulting from multiple hits to the head.

"When I first started getting concussions, no one really knew too much about the healing process," she said. "Now they've learned that taking the time to recover is most important. The most important thing I wish I had known was how to prevent head injuries and how serious they could be."

School Committee Chairman Annie Gilbert noted that concussion prevention needs to be put on the front-burner.

"Our policy does not include prevention of concussions," she said. "Sports leagues, like the Massachusetts Interscholastic Athletic Association, need to start changing their regulations so that we can take steps in the schools to help prevent concussions from happening in the first place."

Given the nature of physical sports like football, soccer and lacrosse, it may impossible to prevent all concussions. But awareness, testing and treatment are good first steps.

WEB QUESTION

Concussions are a serious problem for student-athletes. Do you think enough is being done to prevent and treat them?

Yes. Students are given proper training and testing. No. Parents who think their child is going to play a Div. 1 sport ignore concussions to get their kid back on the ice or

tion. Helmets should be better. Don't care. When I was a kid and I got my 'bell rung' I'd just drink some water and go back in on the next play.







Female golfer Ingram dominating her male opponents to lead Andover

Caroline Ingram can see the fear in her opponent's eyes grow with each pictureperfect shot she sinks.

"At the start of each match I see my opponent start to get jittery because he is playing against me," she said. "He is feeling nervous because he is playing a girl. Then I win a few holes and the pressure really starts to build and I know I am in his head. They may be able to hit it harder and further than me, but I am winning the mental game.'

Winning is exactly what Ingram has done this fall season.

Through six matches, Ingram has raced out to a 6-0 start individually — all against male opponents — for the Andover High golf team that was off to a 4-2 start.

"It has been an incredible start to the season," said the junior. "I wouldn't say I am surprised by my success, because I have always been confident. But I am thrilled to be 6-0. I am so excited."

In just her first varsity season, the lone female on the Golden Warriors's 11-player squad has made quite an impression on her teammates and coaches.

"She has been playing with so much confidence and it has shown in her game," said Warrior coach David Fazio. "It takes guts to play against the guys, but her game is so loud right now, she doesn't have to say a word."

It wasn't that long ago, however, that Ingram admits she was hardly taken by the sport that has become her love.

"I started golfing when I was 9 or 10 with my father and older sister at Winchester Country Club," she said. "I really didn't like it at first. At first it was about making my dad happy, and that he bought us all sorts of fun accessories like pink bags.

"Golf is such a frustrating sport, especially when you are young. You can practice putting for hours, then when you go out to play you still stink at putting. It's about mental toughness."

But the more Ingram played, the more she became addicted. By the time high school approached, she knew she wanted to play for the Golden Warriors

"I had already really started to enjoy it," she said. "Then, when I found out Andover had a team I became so focused on making it. I wanted to play for the high school."

Ingram scored a pair of early victories, then had a breakout individual victory in Andover's loss to North Andover.

a nightmare for male opponents. And that is exactly what Ingram likes.

They are stronger, but I am winning the game between the ears," she said with a laugh. "Guys don't want to go back to their team after losing to a girl. They are afraid to lose to me, and I love taking advantage of that. I have faced opponents who almost chuckle, until they see me hit the ball and I get into their heads.

"I am a very competitive person. I hope I can continue my success the rest of the season, and help lead my team to even more success.'













