

Health care just a click away

Imagine being able to go online and seamlessly access a network of highly qualified local surgeons and specialists

Patients could log on to a website, select the doctor they want to see and, for a \$300 fee, request an appointment — all without a trip to a primary-care doctor, copayment, a battery of tests and a referral.

Vascular surgeon Paula Muto of Andover imagined just that.

She calls it UBERDOC. Launched in December, the patient-to-specialist web app instantly connects patients needing urgent medical care directly to a choice of specialists, bypassing the insurance system that can stall the delivery of health care.

"UBERDOC puts the patients in charge," Muto said. "The doctor works only for the patient, a very transparent and open relationship. That's why we call it the new face of old-fashioned medicine."

Muto comes from a family of surgeons, working out of her father's office in Lawrence. She knows firsthand the challenges and obstacles patients now experience in the current system.

Many times, she said, patients already know what their medical problems are without needing to be seen first by their primary-care physicians, which can often take months for an appointment.

"Surgeons are always trained to listen to patients' chief complaints. The first symptoms they give are often the problem," Muto

Beyond a visit to a primary-care doctor, there are a number of steps patients go through before they reach a specialist or surgeon. Those steps add up both in time and cost.

"UBERDOC seeks to

decrease the cost by avoiding all the steps and by giving patients the choice of finding a local specialist and a time convenient for them outside of insurance restrictions," Muto said.

Muto said she's encountered patients who put off addressing medical issues because they don't have the time to navigate the system. UBERDOC aims to ease the

"The beautiful part is you see the surgeon right away — you don't have to wait or worry ...," she said. "(It's) great for folks who can't or don't want to wait for referrals — they can focus on the problem."

Muto has reached out to more than 300 specialists, including orthopedics, general surgeons, urologists, ENTs, gynecologists, and vascular surgeons, from across Massachusetts and southern New Hampshire to build her team of

participants.
She said the response from her fellow surgeons, locally and nationally, has been overwhelming. Many doctors agreed to lower their office visit price to participate. She said the \$300 fee charged by UBERDOC (\$50 to make the appointment and \$250

what insurance companies charge, but above what Medicare would pay.

"We are thrilled that so many specialists, especially in our community, are willing to lower the price and make it easier for the patient," Muto said. "They recognize the problems in the system."

Muto emphasized the importance of keeping care affordable to patients.

"The scary part (of the current system) is you don't know what it will cost you," she said. "... (UBERDOC) takes out that element."

"So much of our health care is dictated by what the insurance requires," she added, "or what is best for the network. UBER-DOC puts the patients in charge."

Muto and her team are launching the concept for UBERDOC locally to start and are excited to see where it takes them.

"It's nice to know a very qualified surgeon or specialist is going to be able to see you and give you that opinion," she said.

"At the end of the day, surgeons want to solve problems. They want to take on the complex cases." For more information,





a testament to sex ed

Access to birth control and sex education in the schools is paying off.

Recently released figures from the Executive Office of Health and Human Services show Massachusetts has the lowest teen birth rate in the nation — a milestone attributed to increased access to affordable family planning and sex education in the schools.

The Massachusetts rate is 9.4 percent, compared with a national rate of 22.1 percent. And it's been declining for several years.

But while we have much to celebrate with the continuing decline in teen births, much remains to be done.

One troubling trend in the statistics just released is the disparity in rates between nearby communities. Lawrence, for example, has the fourth-highest rate in Massachusetts, at 32.4 percent, and Lynn is right behind it at 32.3 percent. Haverhill and Methuen have teen birth rates that are lower than the national average but still higher than the state average, and still troubling.

But surrounding cities and towns have far lower rates. Peabody, which is right next to Lynn, has a rate of only 3.6 percent. Newburyport, just down the river from Haverhill, had no teen births, while Haverhill's rate was 20.1 percent. Several factors are at play here.

One is economics; communities with large low-income populations tend to have higher teen birth rates. Religious background, which might limit access to contraception, can also be a factor. And ethnicity plays a role: Hispanic teenagers have a birth rate that is seven times higher than that for non-Hispanic teens. In Peabody, for example, 60 percent of its teen births were to Hispanic

Advocates also cite the quality of sex education programs. In Lawrence, where the teen birth rate is also falling, the sex ed curriculum includes birth control but emphasizes abstinence. That focus may help explain the city's teen birth rate, according to Nicole Castillo, director of the Massachusetts Alliance on Teen Pregnancy.

"Abstinence-only sexual education doesn't work," she said. "It's medically inaccurate."

Massachusetts has shown it knows how to prevent teen pregnancies, but those strategies need to be more widespread to reach at-risk kids. Even low-income teens can usually find access to low-cost birth control, either at a school-based health center or a clinic such as Health Quarters or Planned Parenthood. Ensuring that those free or low-cost choices remain available continues to be important.

Locally, however, it would be hard to overstate the value of education, and it is here where the Legislature can make a difference. Massachusetts does not require schools to provide sex education and does not set any standards for schools that do provide it. The result, says Jennifer Childs-Roshak, president of Planned Parenthood League of Massachusetts, is that "school districts are all over the place on it.'

A first step was proposed two years ago in a bill that would have required schools that teach sex ed to do so in a way that is "medically accurate" and "age-appropriate." Whether to teach sex ed in the first place remained a decision for local school leaders.

That bill didn't pass. It has been refiled, and among local legislators who've signed onto it are Sen. Joan Lovely, D-Salem; Rep. Lori Ehrlich, D-Marblehead; Sen. Barbara L'Italien, D-Andover; and Rep. Juana Matias, D-Lawrence.

Ensuring that programs meet some minimum requirements is a start, and it's one that should receive widespread support on Beacon Hill this year.

Teen births have a huge impact on the teenage mothers. their babies and on society, in general, which usually ends up paying financially and socially when kids have kids of their own. Fortunately, this is happening less frequently nowadays, but we can still do better.





DI: Andover kids are winners in every category

On Saturday, March 18, 235 Andover students participated in the Region 5 Destination ImagiNation Tournament at Greater Lawrence Technical School. The students make up 43 teams and of those, 22 placed in the top three of their age group.

Fourteen of those teams placed high enough to go on to the state tournament, which was held Saturday, April 1 at Worcester Poly technic Institute.

"This is, by far, the best day Andover has had at a Regional Tournament,' said Stephanie Maze-Hsu, the Andover Destination ImagiNation Town Coordinator.

Destination ImagiNation, a 501(c)(3) non-profit, "is the world's largest creative problem solving organization with about 200,000 children participating each year around in the US and approximately 20 other nations," according to a press release.

For the second consecutive year, Andover had the largest membership in this in the entire world, Maze-Hsu said.

The Destination Imagi-Nation program encourages teams of students to "have fun, take risks, focus and frame challenges while incorporating STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics), fine arts and service learning, according to the release.

There are four age groups in Destination ImagiNation. Rising Stars is for children in grades kindergarten through second grade. Andover had seven Rising Stars teams who were challenged "to study simple machines and create a complex machine that 'saved the day,' according to the press release. The remaining teams made up the middle- and high school-level age groups.

"Teams must come up with their own ideas, create a story and turn it into a skit based on the guidelines of their challenge,' Maze-Hsu said. "Each challenge also has special requirements that change each year and the teams must design, build and theatrical special effects, costumes, props and scenerv by themselves."

Most Destination Imagi-Nation teams are managed by parents, but several are run through middle schools where teachers Ken Matteucci, Gina Murray and Kathryn Conti all managed teams that will participated in Saturday's state tournament.

"Andover had winners in every competitive challenge," Maze-Hsu said.

"Which is an amazing feat." Students placed in challenges that required them to act out improv skits, create a moving stage, explain the meaning of color, build structures made of just balsa wood and glue, and more.

Former Golden Warrior Russell helps lead Norwich hockey to national title

For Paul Russell, the moment could not have been more perfect.

In the final shift of his final college hockey game, the former Andover High star scored the goal which locked down a national title.

"What a way to go out!" said Russell. "I was just in front of the net and somehow the puck went in. I skated back to the bench and couldn't believe it had all really happened. It was four years of college hockey all coming together and paying off with the perfect ending."

Behind the play of stalwart senior Russell, Norwich University won the **From Andover to** NCAA Division 3 hockey national title, rolling over Trinity 4-1 in the title game last Saturday in Utica, N.Y.

His goal was unassisted to make it 3-1 with 6:19 to play, and was his eight and final goal of his senior year. helping the Cadets surged through the season 27-1-3 to take the crown.

"I'm enjoying it because I know this will be the last time I feel something this special in hockey," said Russell. "This was a very confident team, and we felt like we had a chance to win the title. But looking back it is amazing to see all the hard work from so many people come together and all of us accomplish this. It's awesome."

For Russell, the national title was the culmination of a seven-year journey.

As a sophomore for Andover High, Russell earned Eagle-Tribune All-Star honors. But following the season, the forward elected to leave the Golden Warriors to play junior hockey.

He joined the Boston Junior Bruins of the Eastern Junior Hockey League (EJHL) a winter later. He played three seasons for the Junior Bruins, who are based out of Marlboro, scoring 13 goals with 18 assists in 45 games in his final season. That after he tallied 12 goals in 43 games the

"I had a great time playing hockey at Andover," said, the 5-8, 180-pounder. "But after my sophomore year I decided I wanted a new challenge so I went to the Junior Bruins and met a lot of great people. It was a good experience."

During the recruiting pr cess, Russell found himself drawn to Norwich's history of excellence. That includes now four national titles and 13 Frozen Four appearances in the Division 3 tourney's 34-year history.

"I drew some looks from Division 1 schools, but I wanted to go to a school where I could excel both as an individual and with the team," he said. "I was really impressed with

Coach (Mike) McShane, so I decided to take the leap."

Russell's career started with a bang, scoring two goals in his college hockey debut. He ended his freshman season with 10 goals, added six as a sophomore and 13 goals as a junior.

"Norwich is a very demanding school and th have been a lot of stressful nights," he said. "There were ups and downs, but it has all been very rewarding. how special it was and how

"We had some tough years, and last season we went 17-8-0 and missed the NCAA tournament. So we came into this year on a mission."






