

by Leigh Bardugo



by Ben Mikaelson







The author discusses her childhood and adolescence in Palestine from 1972 to 1981 and chronicles her desire to be a writer.




Cinder

order to protect the world in this futuristic take on the Cinderella story.




Escape from Camp 14 :

by Jason Reynolds


Aspiring to be the fastest sprinter on his elite middle school's track team, gifted runner Ghost finds his goal challenged by a tragic past with a violent father.

rides and the Selma to Montgomery march. (Read one book from the series.)




The name of the star


for crimes committed during the Holocaust.

A brave teen recounts her debilitating struggle with obsessive-compulsive disorder.




Peak

pushes him to climb Mt. Everest, Peak must take into consideration his father's questionable motives.




Rebel belle
