




### Sapiens: a brief history of humankind


volume that incorporates new essays by activist Terry Tempest Williams and Carson biographer Linda Lear.

Two women born a generation apart witness the destruction of their home and family in wartorn Kabul, incurring losses over the course of thirty years that test the limits of their strength and


courage.

from the planet, fight back against their potential destroyers




## Everything I never told you

by Margaret Atwood


Offred, a Handmaid, describes life in what was once the United States, now the Republic of Gilead, a shockingly repressive and intolerant monotheocracy.
